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PUBLIC INFORMATION FOR FEBRUARY

BACK TO SCHOOL

With many people back in work and children back in school, it's important to note that winter illnesses such as flu, COVID-19 and scarlet fever are still circulating. Here are some simple steps to help minimise the spread of infection

- if your child is unwell and has a fever, they should stay at home until they feel better and the fever has gone
- help your child learn about the importance of good hand hygiene and practice regular hand washing at home
- adults are also encouraged to stay at home when unwell, if you do have to go out, wear a face covering and avoid close contact with others.

MAKE SURE YOUR CHILDREN ARE VACCINATED

There have been several reported cases of measles (www.nhs.uk/conditions/measles/) in the Bristol area recently. Measles is a very contagious disease spread easily between unvaccinated people and can cause serious health problems in children but also in pregnant women and their unborn child.

The MMR (measles, mumps and rubella) vaccine is safe and is offered to all children in the UK through their GP practice. The MMR vaccine gives long lasting protection (www.gov.uk/government/ publications/mmr-for-all-general-leaflet/mmrfor-all-general-guide#mmr-vaccine) with just two doses of the vaccine. To check your child's vaccination status, please refer to their personal child health record (red book).

If you or your children are not up to date with vaccinations or if you are in doubt, please contact your GP practice. More information about measles and the MMR vaccine, is available on the NHS website. A full list of NHS vaccinations, including when to have them, is also available online: www.nhs.uk/conditions/vaccinations/nhsvaccinations-and-when-to-have-them/

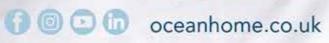
HOW TO HELP OUT IN YOUR COMMUNITY

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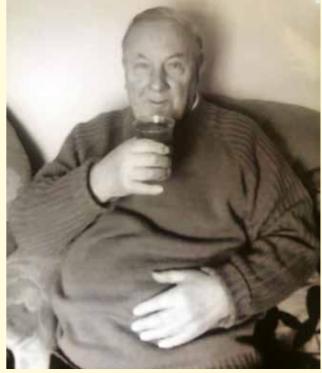
The Shire Community Pages **Farewell to Norman Sims**

Many 'Shire' readers will be familiar with the name Norman Sims, as a man who gave of his time and talents unstintingly to the Evergreens club which met in Shirehampton Public Hall. Sadly, he died on 16th December 2022, a couple of weeks before his 95th birthday and his smiling face and mischievous sense of humour will be missed by many.

He was born in Pilning on 1 January 1928 and after joining the Navy on leaving school, he got to see something of the world, including Hong Kong and Australia. He met his wife Eileen at the Savoy Cinema in Shirehampton, and they lived in the village after their marriage in 1950. He worked at Spillers, in Avonmouth for 30 years but being made redundant he finished his working life at British Gas Seabank works.

It was at this stage in his life that he took over chairmanship of the Evergreens club in about 1994. The Evergreens evolved from the Old Age Pensioners Club founded by Miss Rotha Clay of the Avon University Settlement, in 1920 and because of that connection, Norman as chairman, became a Trustee of the Settlement. The club met on Friday afternoons and included an entertainment programme of choirs, quizzes,

Bingo, fund raising events to defray the cost of coach trips including raffles, and many older people found companionship and fun in the club. A Christmas lunch was a favourite event, often at the Abbey Mill restaurant in Tintern. Annually a new committee was elected or re-elected and a democratic process ensured all members made decisions on what entertainment, activities, and trip destinations they wanted. Regular readers of 'Shire' would have seen the various coach trips advertised and were able to join them. Norman oversaw this process until the advent of Covid which, sadly forced the closure of the club and it has not so far re-opened. Norman was a man who had a heart for serving others in a voluntary role and greatly missed the meetings which had given him an interest in life. He will be remembered with love by his extended family including two great great grandchildren, as well as



those who benefited from his hard work on behalf of the Evergreens. His funeral was held at St Mary's church, and he is buried with wife Eileen. Rest in Peace Norman.

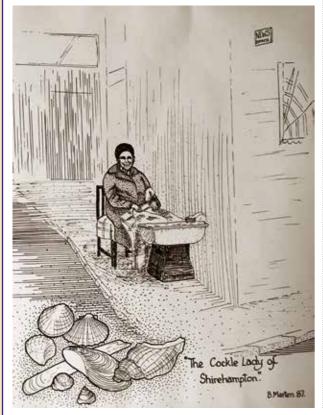

Have you received a new smartphone, tablet, or laptop for Christmas and are not sure how to use it?

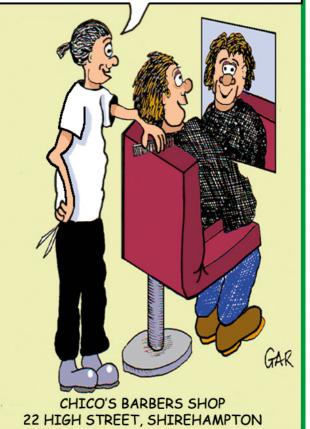

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What Next for Shire Nature Nature **Climate Group**

When we started the Shirehampton Climate Emergency Group, SCEG, back in 2019 our purpose was to help spread the word about the reality of climate change and the terrible effects it would have on our world. We thought that if only enough people understood what was happening, we, as a society, would move quickly to reduce carbon emissions, create a low carbon economy, and prepare ourselves for the worst effects of the extreme weather we knew was already on its way.

But that hasn't happened. After all the campaigns by Extinction Rebellion and Greenpeace, all the pleas and warnings from David Attenborough and Greta Thunberg, all the political effort of Alok Sharma and Antonio Guiterres, we are where we were. THIS GOVERNMENT HAS EVEN PUSHED US BACK, choosing support for coal mines and fossil fuel exploration over green jobs in renewable industry or help with home insulation.

So now what? We set out to keep ourselves and Shirehampton informed about the climate crisis. And we are informed. Many of us here in Shirehampton are individual climate activists, changing our lives and reducing our private carbon footprint in many ways every day. But time is running out and our individual efforts, important as they are, will not be enough. We have to find peaceful legal ways to put pressure on government to ACT.

But apart from joining collective national action, what should we be doing now? We think the most important thing SCEG has to offer now is mutual support for one another as we face the reality of climate change and its effects on all our lives. We've decided to meet less often, once a month on the 2nd Tuesday, and more informally in one another's homes. We'll be able to check in with each other, report back on local and individual actions and events, share information, discuss what we've read, plan ad hoc local actions and, importantly, welcome others who share our concerns about climate change and need a place to express the grief and fear, love and rage, we all are feeling.

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Tandem Arts New Year Update

As in previous years, Tandem Arts is offering 'winter woolly craft' sessions such as spinning, felting, weaving, crochet and knitting. As I write this it is freezing cold, and I am looking to upcycling old woollies to add extra insulation to our windowsills. This is a simple project that doesn't take a lot of time but will make a difference to reducing draughts and heat loss in the home.

At the studio there is now a four shaft loom which at the JTE hub has been donated to us. It is currently waiting to be warped up and ready to go. The loom is a new and exciting asset and an opportunity for weaving larger items such a shawl, throw, towel or table runner.

Annelies (who is the director together with two other co-directors of Tandem Arts) has been working as a sessional worker at the 'Welcome Space' at the JTE Hub in the Methodist Church since the beginning of December. These sessions are funded for a total of 12 weeks which means you can get a taster of Tandem's winter programme

Trying out something new, exploring a new environment with new people can bring with it positive experiences and benefits which can surprise us.

An Update from Darren Jones MP, Bristol North West

New year, same problems? It can sometimes feel like the same issues go round and round. But with perseverance, I believe we can always make a difference.

At the end of 2022, **First Bus** cut hundreds of services across Bristol, including nine on routes 3 and 4 on Saturdays, worsening the existing problem of a lack of bus provision for Shire residents. Improving our bus services will be a long and difficult journey, but rest assured, this will be a high-priority area for me in the coming months. The first stop is to meet with **Doug Claringbold**, the **Managing Director of First Bus in the West of England**, to question him on why they are failing to deliver an adequate and reliable service! By the time you read this, the meeting will have already taken place and video footage of my line of questioning posted to **Facebook (fb.com/ darrenjonesmp)**, so please do take a look.

For vulnerable residents, bus services offer a lifeline to access healthcare and help prevent feelings of isolation. We are therefore very lucky to have the services of the **Lawrence Weston Community Transport (LWCT)** team in our community, providing low-cost transport around Bristol for community groups and people with disabilities. (You can contact them on **weekday mornings on 0117 329 4647**.) My office has been in touch with LWCT recently to see how we can share their knowledge and experiences of running a community transport scheme to potentially replicate this fantastic model elsewhere in my constituency. It might be a long road ahead to improve our bus services, but for **Iron Bridge** we can finally see the light at the end of the tunnel: planning permission to fix the bridge was **unanimously approved** by councillors in late December! After seven years, this has clearly taken too long, but it shows what can come from a bit of grit and determination. I was happy to help keep the spotlight on this issue and to continue to raise it with the Council over recent years, but there are many others who campaigned tirelessly to help make this happen.

One of the biggest problems to have rolled over into this year is the cost-of-living crisis. With more people accessing foodbanks than ever before, I'm delighted that my nomination for **Bristol North West Foodbank** to be considered for a grant from **National Grid's Community Matters Fund has led to the charity receiving £2,000** to support its work this winter. When I visited the foodbank in December, the staff told me the money would likely go towards helping people with top-ups for prepayment meters rather than food. This is a real sign of the times and a stark reminder that even more people are having to choose between heating and eating this winter.

The reason for this closure was due to the depletion of members during the pandemic, illness, mobility issues and lack of new, younger members to carry on the great work of local history in the making. Financial issues also played a part.

Renee Slater, Chairperson - Shire Community Newspaper: "Shire newspaper is entirely created by volunteers. Only the printer and the professional page designer get paid. Volunteers write, edit, distribute, and deliver the paper each month. Volunteers deal with advertising, finance, and admin. Volunteers organize Carols on the Green every year. And your local advertising only just about covers our printing costs. Shire is truly a community newspaper. Without the volunteers it wouldn't exist and without your advertising it wouldn't survive."

Amanda Parsons, Hall Manager - Shirehampton Public Hall: "The volunteers at the Public Hall are essential to its survival. The Hall has always been dependant on a huge amount of good will, without which it surely would not survive. Our volunteers have shown so much loyalty and dedication over the years and have made my job as manager a lot easier, especially as I am parttime! Our volunteers are responsible for the transformation of the garden from a wild mess to its current sanctuary status, they have redecorated rooms, opened up for private hirers and donated their skills on a number of levels such as plumbing a new toilet into the Bradley Room! Let's also not forget that our Trustees are volunteers, and without them we would not have a Hall at all - they are a legal requirement for our existence, which is why I'm always pleading for more!"





Ash Bearman, Community Development Officer. - SCAF: "SCAF just wouldn't work without our team of fantastic local resident volunteers! From our Board of Trustees to the Shire Community Plan Steering Committee. Many lead/chair our action groups - Shire Greens (environment) Shire Planning Group, others manage & volunteer at our monthly community market & we have dedicated walk leaders for our weekly Walkie Talkies & Nomads walking groups. A massive thank you to you all - it wouldn't happen without you! However, we will never say no to new volunteers who will help SCAF continue into the future"

Ed & Gail Amphlett, Craft Exhibition, Shirehampton: "The Shirehampton Craft Exhibition is an annual community event that has run for over 40 years. It is totally reliant on volunteers. There is a voluntary organising group that takes on advertising, devising the application form, process, entering the applications into a spread sheet, creating the labels, matching the entries to the applications, organising, and managing the volunteers who take on the various roles below. A volunteer organises the hunt for the children in the hall, asking for exhibits on a theme. The strongarm team of volunteers set up the boards and layout the hall, washing everything down after a year in storage. Once open, volunteers provide the homemade cakes that make the coffee area such a success. The stewarding, demonstrations and the catering is all undertaken by volunteers who not only keep the exhibits safe but give the exhibition its friendly welcoming, atmosphere. This event can't happen without the contribution of people who give their time and energy to make this event the success it is."

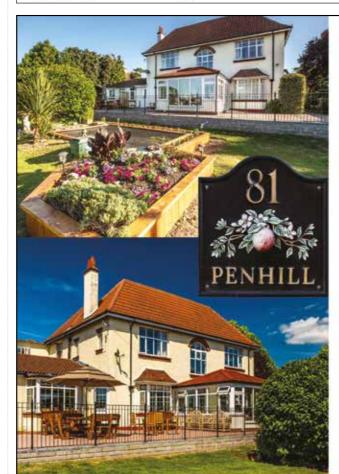

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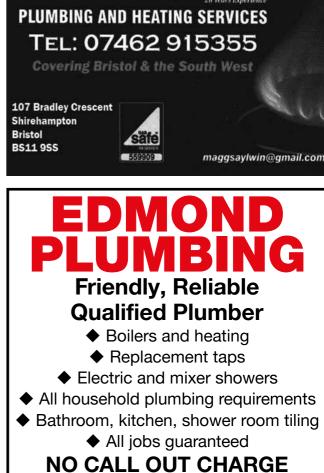

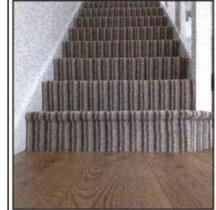
