Return of the Legendary Cockle Lady


Lee Worthy was sat having breakfast in a local cafe with a friend. Looking out the window they were reminiscing about the Cockle Lady.

WELCOMING SPACES

LATEST CENSUS DATA PUBLISHED

The population of Bristol has grown by over 10 percent in the last decade according to figures from the latest census. The number of people calling the city home has risen by over 44,000 to 472,500. This is higher than the overall increase for England and Wales (6.6 percent), where the population grew by nearly 3.5 million to 59,597,500.

The city is now made up of more than 287 ethnic groups, with almost 19 percent of the population born outside of the UK. There are more than 90 languages spoken throughout the city, and more than 45 religions represented, although more than half (51 percent) of people do not consider themselves to be religious. This is the third highest proportion out of all local authorities in England.

Other key facts from the latest census include:

- Bristol has a relatively young population with more children than people over 65.
- The median age of people living in Bristol is 32.4 (compared to 40.3 in England and Wales).
- There are 191,600 households in the city, up by 4.9 percent (8,900 homes) since 2011.
- 26.7 percent of households have dependent children (51,100).
- Almost 9,500 veterans make up 2.4 percent of the population over 16.

BRISTOL CITY COUNCIL SECURE £1BN INVESTMENT TO BECOME NET ZERO

Bristol City Council is entering into a world-first partnership, which will bring in over £1bn of investment to help make Bristol carbon neutral and climate resilient by 2030. Approved by Cabinet yesterday (6 December), the council will enter a joint venture with Ameresco Limited, and Vattenfall Heat UK as an essential subcontractor, to transform the way the city generates, distributes, stores and uses energy.

The ground-breaking venture, known as **Bristol City Leap**, will rapidly increase the scale and pace of investment in low carbon energy infrastructure such as wind energy, solar energy, low carbon heat networks as well as other energy efficiency measures and smart energy systems.

During the first five years of the twenty-year partnership, the private sector will invest at least £424m in a range of large infrastructure projects to reduce Bristol's carbon footprint by Bristol City Council Secure £1BN Investment to help city become net zero140,000 tonnes. Projects will include a major expansion of Bristol's award-winning Heat Network, providing local businesses and residents with access to reliable, affordable low carbon heat from sustainable sources. Solar panels and low carbon heating systems will also be installed at local schools and the council's social housing will be made more energy efficient with the aim of reducing energy bills.

The partnership will also bring over \pounds 61.5m of social value to the city with the creation of over 1,000 new jobs, apprenticeships and work placements during the first five years alone. A Community Energy Development Fund worth \pounds 1.5m will be invested into local communities and, in the future, it is hoped that decarbonisation support can be offered to public sector properties such as hospitals and schools to support Bristol's wider efforts to be carbon neutral by 2030.

Lizzi Testani, Chief Executive Officer of the Bristol Green Capital Partnership, said: "Bristol City Leap presents a major opportunity to accelerate Bristol's progress towards its ambition to be carbon neutral by 2030 – bringing infrastructure and major investment to the city. This is a huge partnership for Bristol and due to its scale, ensuring its ability to deliver genuine social value for the city has been a major part of the procurement process. Bristol Green Capital Partnership is really looking forward to working with City Leap to engage communities and businesses to maximise the opportunities for inclusive climate action across Bristol."



Scarlet Fever and Invasive Group A Strep

You may have seen in the news that there has been an increase in cases of scarlet fever and invasive Group A Strep (iGAS) in children.

Scarlet Fever

Scarlet fever is a common childhood infection caused by **Group A Strep (GAS)**. It is not usually serious but should be treated with antibiotics to reduce the risk of complications and spread to others.

Symptoms include a sore throat, headache, fever, nausea and vomiting. After 12 to 48 hours the red rash develops, usually starting on the stomach and chest before spreading to other parts of the body.

If you think your child may have scarlet fever:

- contact your GP surgery or call 111 as soon as possible
- make sure your child takes the full course of antibiotics prescribed, even if they start to feel better during the course
- stay at home, away from nursery, school or work for at least 24 hours after starting antibiotic treatment to avoid spreading the infection.

Invasive Group A Strep

If the bacteria causing scarlet fever enters the bloodstream, this can cause invasive Group A Strep. Although very uncommon, there has also been an increase in cases recently.

Contact your GP or call 111 if your child:

- is not recovering from scarlet fever
- is eating less than normal
- has had a dry nappy for 12 hours or more or shows other signs of dehydration
- is under three months and has a temperature of 38C, or is older than three months and has a temperature of 39C or higher
- feels hotter than usual when you touch their back or chest, or feels sweaty
- is very tired or irritable.

Call 999 or go to A&E if:

- your child is having difficulty breathing
- your child's skin, tongue or lips are blue
- your child is floppy and will not wake up or stay awake.

The Self-Created Locked Ward

I hate new year's resolutions – absolutely hate them, until it is time to make them. Then I have all sorts of plans. I am adamant that this year I am going to change my life – turn it upside-down – fix it and fine-tune my routine.

This year, however, as I moved into Shirehampton in September, I decided that this would be my new year and that in the middle of an ordinary year (although I don't suppose immigrating counts as an ordinary year), I would start living an extra-ordinary life. I turned to books, this time choosing to listen to an audiobook rather than trying to find time to read a book. I had seen The Locked Ward advertised on social media and quickly **Dennis O'Donnell** (the author) became my companion on every journey that I undertook in my vehicle and what a journey it has been.

Dennis has taught me about life not only in mental health wards, but as I have walked through his book with him, he has taught me about new beginnings, making me ponder on questions such as "Why do we look at others with so much judgment?" or "Is it true that, but for the grace of God, there goes anyone of us." My September resolution has spilt over into my life making me more and more conscious of those around me, making me think twice before getting upset about the old man walking down the street, saying silly things, and waving at others, or, getting upset with the lady behind the counter that appears to be agitated. I have learnt to approach each one differently, every time ensuring that, before I judge the person or get upset with the person, to understand that they may be facing a situation that I could never understand.

In November, on a cold and wet Monday morning I ran into the nail bar looking dreadful with no makeup on and I think, just before I took my daughter to school, I may have put a brush through my hair, although I can never be sure. As I walked in on that Monday morning a lady greeted me and started talking to me out of the blue. No judgment regarding my ill-fitting, Monday morning hair and make-up. No, she just reached out to me and there, in the middle of an ordinary rushed Monday morning, I made a friend who has now become a lifeline to me. As I ponder about this friendship and the way it came about, I know that, should she have judged me on what she saw, she would never have greeted me, let alone have invited me over for tea later in the week and a friendship of a lifetime would have slipped by me and now I wonder, how many friendships have slipped by me because I have been the one forcing myself to live in a self-made locked ward? And how many other friendships have I lost because I have judged others, whether knowingly or unknowingly, and thought maybe they should be in a locked ward.

My hope and prayers are that we will all break free from the locked wards that we have created for ourselves and start experiencing an extra-ordinary life in the midst of another ordinary year ahead.

Community-Owned Local Projects Lead the Way to a Greener Future

2022 was a disappointing year for our Climate. Cop 27 failed to deliver the necessary commitment to reduce carbon emissions. The government has turned a blind eye to the reality of climate change and its catastrophic effects.

But there IS some good news. The Bristol Energy Cooperative switched on the solar roof at the Bottle Yard Studios and work is beginning on the Lawrence Weston onshore wind turbine, set to be the biggest in the country. These are communityowned local projects driven by local people, but they will have a national impact. We are all finding ways to reduce our energy bills by reducing our energy use. To help us with this the Shirehampton Climate Emergency Group (SCEG) and the Community Action Forum (SCAF) will be organizing an Energy Advice morning in the new year. We'll be inviting the Bristol Energy Network, C.H.E.E.S.E (Cold Homes Energy Efficiency Survey Experts), and local tradesmen who can answer questions about what you can do to reduce energy use AND make your homes warmer.

Shirehampton Climate Emergency Group wants to support local climate initiatives of all kinds so we'd like to know about what YOU are doing to reduce energy use and still keep warm. Bramble Clearing and Pond Preparation for New Look Daisy Field

The Daisy Field is a green space you may have missed whilst driving along the Portway to work, home or trips away. It is part of Lamplighters Marsh, being a site of Nature Conservation Interest and a Local Nature Reserve. It's history has been mixed from grazing land to the 'Remount Station' which was set up during WWI to import, train and send horses on active service. It was even a landfill site until 1976 when it was grassed over.

In 2015 Friends Of Lamplighters Marsh was formed, being a volunteer group made up by local residents. In a way they are guardians of the area. They maintain and enhance this community open green space throughout the year. Work days are usually a couple of hours mainly on a Saturday to clear away brambles, buddleia and other invasive plants to protect unusual habitat and wildlife. FOLM as they are known also organise walks during the summer with experts including Steve England and Ed Drewitt.

On **Saturday 3rd December** the work party consisting of eight volunteers were clearing away



long grass and brambles from the many saplings that had been planted in the **Daisy Field** in 2021. Where the wooden bench sits at the top of the slope, you now have a view of Pill with the dreadful brambles having been cleared away. Armed with cutting equipment **John H, Stephen, John K, Ed, Vick, Renée and Juliet** showed great enthusiasm in clearing away the undergrowth and even cleared the area where a new pond will be installed in 2023. The cold and grey skies did not dampen their spirit and they made great inroads.

Preparations for the installation of a small pond began at the Daisy Field on **7th December** with the **Parks Department** help. Lining with clay was the next stage on the **9th December** with work expected to be finished sometime in January. Along with the **War Horse statue** being installed in the Daisy Field in 2023, it certainly will be a busy year for FOLM.



As I write this update, the World Cup is in full swing, but a little closer to home we've had our own good news. I first chipped in to support our own football club in Shire back in January 2021, with a letter to Bristol City Council highlighting the need to invest in local sporting facilities following the long demise of other community facilities, such as the swimming pool, the youth centre and the Robin Cousins Sports Centre. Last summer, with planning permission at a standstill, I wrote another letter to the Council in which I shared my admiration of the club's ambition to progress through the leagues of grassroots football. To do that, we needed to update the grounds to include better lighting and a visitors stand. I'm thrilled to share that the club's application has now been approved - a great result!

development on the edges of the Kingsweston estate and the impact of lighting on the natural environment. Having spoken with Shire FC about their proposals and liaising with relevant stakeholders as part of the planning permission, it was agreed that the club has suitable mitigations to limit the impact of the proposed changes. Experts agreed that the impacts of the development were outweighed by the benefits of having a good quality and well-used local football club.

I know that some local people had concerns about It has also been great to hear how the World Cup has been good for business for community pubs. With rising energy costs, this is a difficult time for all small businesses, so it's great that people have been heading to their local pubs to watch the matches. I'll be bringing Pub Politics to Shire on 19th January and, in addition to a wider discussion on local and national issues, I plan to speak with the pub's owners about the difficulties that they're facing. And finishing off this hat-trick of good news, a date has finally been set for the planning application to fix the Iron Bridge to go in front of the planning committee. After a seven-year wait, the plans are set to be reviewed on 21st December. Regular readers will know that I have lobbied repeatedly for the Council to make these essential repairs. We still need the planning application to be approved, but since these are not controversial plans, the road ahead looks clear for the bridge to finally be restored!

Finally, my family and I would like to wish you all a Happy New Year. It is a privilege to represent my home area as your Member of Parliament, and I will continue to work hard as your voice in Parliament and your champion in Bristol with whatever challenges and opportunities 2023 brings.





War Horse Celebration Concert

One word – three syllables – FAB-U-LOUS! - if I may echo the words of Strictly's Craig Revel Horwood – as I can think of no better way to describe the Cameo Orchestra's concert on Saturday, 19 November at St Mary's Church to raise funds to build the War Horse statute here in Shirehampton.



The Cameo Orchestra are a 27 strong Bristol orchestra based in Warmley and they often perform gigs to raise money for local causes. Straight into the concert they opened up with very recognisable music such as George Gershwin's 1930s jazz-inspired number "Summertime" which transported me to hazy, lazy sultry summer evenings. More popular familiar tunes followed from Rodgers & Hammerstein's Broadway musical "Oklahoma" and they got us swaying to Rodgers' melodic "Edelweiss"! Also fitting for the theme of the evening were some beautiful and majestic military-themed music such as Holst's "The Marching Song" and beautiful and passionate music from the musical Miss Saigon set in the Vietnam War. For me though, the most moving part of the concert was a medley of

famous **World War I "Music from the Trenches"** - well known songs sung by the troops that everyone would recognise from films and old newsreels.

St Mary's Church has fantastic acoustics which made the concert all the better. I learnt that evening that the **War Office** considered **Shirehampton** an ideal place to bring all the horses before they were to be shipped off to the front from the docks in **Avonmouth** and Shirehampton had by far the largest remount depot in the country.






The club was sad to hear of the passing of **Tony Gardiner**, a friend from the **Bristol Arrow Club** who came on club tours and breaks over a number of years.


