Accessing Food

If you're struggling to afford food at the moment, there are organisations and schemes across the city which can help you. Your local community centre is a really good place to visit to ask about what food services might be available in your neighbourhood or you could email **info@feedingbristol.org.uk**.

There are a number of foodbanks across Bristol for those who are eligible, with friendly volunteers available to talk about your needs and how they might be able to help:

- North Bristol and South Gloucestershire Foodbank
- Bristol North West Foodbank and Homebank
- South and East Bristol Foodbank

Visit the **Too Good to Go website (www.toogoodtogo.co.uk/en-gb)** to find out how you can buy food from cafés, restaurants and shops at a reduced price, when it hasn't sold in time.

On the Olio website (www.olioex.com) you can find people giving away free food to their community

Here are just a few top tips you could follow to help you save money on food:

- plan your meals buying food for the week helps to cut down on impulse buys
- convenience stores and small supermarkets are often a lot more expensive
- be wary of supermarket deals we can often end up spending more than usual
- if you can, buy food like rice and pasta in bulk it is often much cheaper per 100g
- 'reduced to clear' foods can help save money but think about when/how you'll eat them before you buy what you need buy loose fruit & veg and buy only what you are going to eat.

Cost of Living Support

The council has a Cost of Living Support web page: www.bristol.gov.uk/costofliving

It provides advice and guidance on topics including housing, benefits and financial help, employment and skills, mental health and well being, and provides links to useful websites and community organisations. It includes information on the city's network of **Welcoming Spaces** where people can meet up, socialise, keep warm and access support. **There are now 37 spaces open in the city.**

Our Citizen Service Point, located at 100 Temple Street, BS1 6AG, is also on hand if you need help using the council's services or need access to a computer. The opening hours are Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday 9am to 5pm, Wednesday 10am to 5pm. The service is closed on bank holidays.

You can also call the We Are Bristol phone line on 0800 694 0184, Monday to Friday 8.30am to 5pm.

Saving Money on Energy Bills

As temperatures drop and energy prices rise many residents are concerned about how much their bills will go up.

Here are just a few tips that may help to reduce your energy bills. You can also check if you're eligible for help at www.bristol.gov.uk/benefits-financial-help

- turn your appliances off standby mode and you could save around £55 a year
- use your washing machine on a 30-degree cycle instead of higher temperatures
- be careful in the kitchen avoid overfilling the kettle and only boil the amount of water you need
- keeping your shower time to just four minutes could save a typical household £65 a year on their energy bills
- \blacksquare avoid using the tumble dryer and dry clothes outside or on racks where possible to save around £55 a year
- only run your dishwasher when it is full to reduce the amount of water you use.

There is support for people on non-smart prepayment meters too.

From the **beginning of October**, households on prepayment meters should have received vouchers as part of the government's **Energy Bill Support Scheme**.

If you've received a voucher don't forget to redeem it as it's only valid for 90 days. If you've not received one contact your energy supplier.

Can YOU Sing in Bristol Male Voice Choir?

Bristol Male Voice Choir has been singing for over fifty years, entertaining audiences in locations in and around the city as well as going on tour at home and abroad. The choir started life as Filton MVC but changed its name to Bristol Male Voice Choir because its members were joining from many parts of the city and surrounding areas, though not yet from Shirehampton, according to recent figures. The connection with the city is important for the choir; they sang in Canada with our local dignitaries to commemorate the anniversary voyage of Cabot's ship the Matthew; they carried the flag to Bristol's twin city in France, Bordeaux, on a more recent tour to France and Spain and they regularly join with choirs from all over the world competing in the Cornwall international Male Voice choir festival based in Truro.

"I can't sing" is the response sometimes given when the choir invites new members to join. But it soon becomes clear that in fact singing in the shower, at the football, after the football in the bar, with the karaoke, and at parties, is a regular pastime for many undiscovered talents. When visitors drop into the choir's weekly rehearsals they get hooked into the great sound that 50 voices can make. The choir is led by Jo Scullin and accompanied by pianist Clair Hiles. Their teaching of the music takes new members, non-readers of music and men who didn't know a tenor from a baritone to the point where they produce a two-hour concert of songs which have been entirely memorised. So "I can't sing" becomes "We sing because we love the experience of all those voices around us".

The songs themselves? The latest songs being learned by the Choir are by Neil Diamond and Coldplay, while the Christmas schedule is the annual revival of traditional carols. Mozart and Bach, Elvis and the Beatles, sea shanties, gospel songs, spirituals and traditional male voice favourites complete the

programme of 2022. If you would like to sample our music and come and hear the choir in rehearsal, they meet at

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An Update from Darren Jones MP, Bristol North West


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Getting stuff done can often take a lot of patience and determination, whether you're a local resident campaigning for a cause or a politician supporting a local community. This is especially the case for infrastructure. Seven years is clearly too long to wait for the Iron Bridge to be fixed, and we're still waiting for work to start. That's why so many people turned out for the recent protest to mark seven years since the Iron Bridge was damaged.

As your local MP, I have been doing my bit to champion this issue. Most recently, I raised the delay to these essential repairs with the **Chief Executive of Bristol City Council** and was assured that the money for the works has been ring-fenced. I had been a little bit nervous about that, given the Council is facing a huge deficit in its budget. Progress may be slow, but the money and the desire to carry out the work is still there.

The work on the bridge is going to be outsourced, but the Council has not yet got to the stage of procuring a company. I would like to see this happen as quickly as possible – not least because the cost for the work will increase the longer it is left considering the current situation with the UK's economy.

I know how few Council planning officers there are nowadays, doing the work for the whole city, so they are incredibly busy. But we've waited a very long



time for this, and it is not a controversial proposal – we just need to get it approved. Rest assured, I'll continue to lobby the Council to prioritise this work until it's completed!

For those of you interested in cycling, I was pleased to recently support the city's bid to the national 'Levelling Up' fund to invest in a new national cycling centre behind Henacre Road in Lawrence Weston (where I lived until I was 12!). The Council has published artist impressions of the proposed centre, showing how it would have multiple purposes: a venue to host competitive track cycling events; a traffic-free space for children to learn how to ride a bike; and opportunities for people and businesses to test ride electric bikes and cargo bikes. We'll have to keep our fingers crossed for the funding!

ANNUAL CONSULTATION LAUNCHED TO HELP INFORM COUNCIL FIVE-YEAR BUDGET

Bristol City Council has a substantial deficit and is in a cost of operating crisis. With some way to go to deliver a balanced budget, views are being sought on savings proposals put forward by Bristol City Council for the city's finances over the coming five years (2023-2028).

The proposed budget warns of a worsening financial challenge ahead. Council leaders warn that if they are to continue to spend on priority areas, the authority must find a mix of additional income and cost savings worth between £37.5 and £87.6 million, - 9% - 20% of the council's core budget over the coming five years. This will require a major redesign of the council to continue delivering vital frontline services and invest in the areas needed to meet critical ambitions, such as becoming a net zero city by 2030 and delivering sufficient housing for all.

Marvin Rees, Mayor of Bristol, said: "It's clear that we are currently living through a national cost of living crisis that shows no signs of ending anytime soon. Councils are underfunded and government shows no willingness to act in partnership with city leaders. As a result, we have a substantial shortfall in our funding and we must make the council smaller, do less and focus in on our priorities. A decade of austerity and failing Westminster financial policies have created a situation we cannot entirely shield the city from.

"In my recent **State of the City address** I promised the people of Bristol that we would do our best to support the city through this crisis but that we can't pretend to hold off all of the hardship. If we are to continue to meet our statutory obligations including providing housing, delivering care for the elderly and disabled, creating school places and helping people through the cost of living crisis, we are going to have to let go of some of the things we've fought hard to protect over the past six years.

"There is still plenty we will continue to do. Our priority of building a city of hope and ambition remains. We've built the foundations of a resilient city that has the ability to overcome these challenges and the potential to support communities to prosper. We will actively work with all partners, locally, regionally, and nationally, including other councils, to reshape local government to fit the model forced onto us by government."

The Council is seeking views on proposals to raise additional income and cut costs to help inform its budget planning before a final decision is made by all Bristol councillors in February 2023.

Those taking part in the consultation will be asked to show a preference for the rate of **Council Tax and Adult Social Care Precept*** to be charged from **April 2023**. Participants will also be asked for their views on a number of proposals for reducing costs, a number of which will not be consulted on again before a final decision is made in February. Every 1% increase in Council Tax or Social Care Precept in 2023/24 would raise £2.5 million that would otherwise need to be found through additional savings or efficiencies.

Proposals for reducing costs and generating further income amount to £46 million over the coming five years. The current worst case forecast for the budget gap during this period stands at £87.6 million. Further difficult decisions may be required in February 2023 and beyond to bridge the estimated £41 million gap remaining. Further proposals may be required, and additional consultation could follow.

Since the council passed its current budget in March 2022, there have been significant changes on a national and global stage that are having a direct impact on the authority's financial forecasts, resulting in an estimated £3.4 billion in additional costs for councils in 2023/24, rising to £4.5 billion in 2024/25. Nine in ten councils nationally expect budget shortfalls next year and we're no different.

"This consultation sets out the full scale of the challenge we face. We cannot borrow our way out of this situation. We have carefully built-up savings that are available should we need them, and we may have to use these to bridge gaps in our finances, but these must be paid back. The only sensible and sustainable route forward is to shrink as a council, something we predicted would be necessary in 2018, and focus our limited resources where they're needed most.

"Residents and businesses have the opportunity to share their view on these proposals now and will also be asked for input during future consultations on some proposals that have yet to be fully worked up. I urge everyone to take part in this conversation to help inform our approach and the decision that needs to be taken in February next year."

* Social Care Precept is an additional charge that councils may be permitted to add on top of the Council Tax increase to help pay for social care. The government decides each year how much, if any, Social Care Precept councils can levy.



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Climate Action in Bristol

November was a busy month for Climate activists. COP 27 began on the 6th and some people from Shirehampton joined Christian Climate Action in daily vigils in support of the Egyptian Human Rights COP27 Coalition and all the activists and human rights campaigners imprisoned in Egypt.

We joined the hundreds of people who attended the Day of Action mass meeting and march organized by the Bristol Climate Justice Coalition on November 12. Jonathan Dimbleby spoke powerfully about the devastation climate change is causing in Africa right now and there were speakers from many branches of the Coalition. It was a colourful and good-natured demonstration, but there was a deep sense that government was doing

far too little to reduce the carbon emissions which are causing climate change.

The rally was also in support of the campaign to stop airport expansion. People from Shirehampton had joined in peaceful demonstrations outside the County Court earlier in the week. The High Court was sitting in Bristol to consider the final decision on expanding Bristol Airport. We were there to remind the decision makers that a huge majority of local

people are opposed to expansion. We understand the damage expansion will cause not only to the environment but, crucially, to the possibility of achieving the government's legally binding targets to reduce carbon emissions by 2030.

Shirehampton Climate Emergency Group will hold it's last meeting for 2022 on Tuesday December 13th at 7:30 pm in the Cotswold Community Centre. This will be a social meeting with mince pies and a chance to talk about what we would like to do in the New Year to reduce climate change. Do join us!

Nature Nites

I was lucky enough to join a group of fellow nature watchers a couple of weeks ago. With our very knowledgeable leader, Ed Drewett, we took a walk along what is affectionately known as The Yellow Brick Road to catch sight of the birds that are there.

As I mentioned last month how few birds were to be seen further up the riverbank where I live, I didn't expect to be as astonished as I was by the tremendous variety that awaited us all! Lamplighters Nature Reserve did not disappoint.

On entering the reserve from the pub end, we saw mostly jackdaws, crows and the like, and as it was early morning they were busily hunting above us for food. The further along we walked, the smaller the birds became. There were great tits, blue tits, goldfinches, dunnocks, and even a green finch was spotted. And many others besides. At one point we all gasped at seeing a sparrow hawk pursuing a goldfinch! Happy to report the goldfinch got away.



The sheer numbers of birds taking advantage of the generous amount of seeds and fruit still available on the reserve was truly wonderful. Ed explained that due to the lack of rain earlier in Spring, the trees had been able to produce and retain a lot more of their bounty as the flower heads had not been ripped away from the trees, and so much more survived. As well as seeing the reserve birds, we were able to watch the wading birds across on the other side of the river. There were red shanks and curlews, which looked amazing through the binoculars, and that made my day.

The picture this month was just an impulse. I nearly crushed it as I walked the dogs the other day, so quickly picked it up and decided it might make a nice addition to this month's effort! Aren't the colours beautiful?

Work on Portishead Line to Begin

West of England Combined Authority has announced that the long-awaited reopening of the train line between Bristol and Portishead has been given the green light for works to get underway. Planning permission and environmental necessary consents have been granted by the approval of a Development Consent Order. This follows the additional funding agreed in July by the West of England Combined Authority, led by Metro Mayor Dan Norris, and North Somerset Council for the reopening and makeover.

"This is a project long in the making and undoubtedly there will be more bumps in the road. However, this important thumbs up keeps us firmly on the right track, and means the hard work of physically bringing this rail line back to life can begin. This is a really important project that will see communities in south Bristol and across our city reconnected to Portishead and help in our vital quest for net-zero"

CREATE TO ELEVATE

This month we are showcasing the youth group at the Hall, Create to Elevate. Tom Bradley, a local resident and dedicated Youth Leader, said:


We started 'Create to Elevate' in the summer of 2021 and have had a few volunteers come and go while trying to establish a group. It initially started at the Cotswold Centre and moved to the Public Hall in the spring of 2022. The concept of the group is to provide a space for those between the ages of 12 and 15 to consider the reality of the world they are growing up into; the constructive and destructive social forces we are all immersed in, and the perception of themselves, their peers, and the community. We use creative arts including music, visual art, and scenario discussion to help us explore abstract concepts. We are hoping to learn about the connection between

self-development and community development – how these two are interdependent processes.

For a group of this nature to work, it seems crucial to have trust and constancy established between the 'animators' (adults overseeing the group) and the rest of the group. It is an ongoing learning process, and we are early into it, but we hope it provides a much-needed service in the community and is practically useful on many levels. The programme is inspired by the Junior Youth Empowerment program created by the Ruhi Institute and the group is sponsored by the Bristol Baha'i Community.

If you visited the exhibition for the first time or have been coming for many of its 40 years, there is a more serious consideration if you want it to continue. Over the decades it has been a non-profit making celebration of craftspeople in the local area and has been organised by a core person or couple ably assisted by a team of other volunteers. The profile has changed in that the items not for sale have reduced and the demand for items to purchase has increased, and if selling their work enables craftspeople to continue then that is a positive trend. However the issue is that key organisers are getting older and continuity of planning is required. Should the exhibition continue in its current format or be replaced with a shorter sales orientated event?

The current team will do one more exhibition so if you wish to see it continue in its current format beyond 2023, volunteers are required to carry out

specific tasks, working alongside the current key people (Ed and Gail Amphlett). These tasks include core organisation, tabulating all the entries and creating labelling, publicity coordination ideally expanding the online presence, and a team of younger, fitter people to set up and close down (an hour for each task). So over to you, but in the meantime we must thank the great team led by Gail and Ed who have produced yet another spectacular event this year. As always we must thank Jenny for her vision in displaying the items to greatest effect, and Sue and her team for serving refreshments all week. If somebody had to stand outside our house, between the leaves that have fallen, the wetness that is always around in Bristol, the beautiful Christmas lights and the loneliness that surrounds you when you look in from the outside, they would most certainly think that my life is one endless do-over. I, however, have become accustomed to my routine and in my routine, I find security and peace. From the outside looking in, it is a cold place, but on the inside, it is a warm home, with laughter and, at times, tears. Familiar smells and a soft blanket when cuddling on the couch, brings a calmness that I suspect looks like a life of boredom from the outside, but is pure bliss here, on the inside.

On my drive to fetch my partner from work yesterday, always driving the same road (the routine gives me great satisfaction) I noticed that I was looking into other people's homes, not from a cold and wet place, but from the comfort of my vehicle, looking through the rain, into the cold, and through the windows of other people's homes. It has become very evident since moving to the UK, that here in my new country people do life differently, very few have thick heavy curtains to keep the world out, no, these new friends of mine live with their lives open, inviting you to share their lives with them.

I noticed through the big windows, that inside these homes it may look like a boring, monotonous home, but when you peer deeper (while waiting for the traffic light to change colour), you see the mom bringing the dad a cup of tea while the kids are in their rooms, possibly doing what kids do. The fire is burning, and the Christmas lights are shining. I don't see a coldness and a hardness, but I see routine. Maybe every family has a routine, whether it be a precise one, a semi-structured one or even for some, no routine is their routine. One thing is for sure, standing in the cold, outside, looking in, you may think that boredom and monotony is what life is about, but inside, in the warm and comfort of a routine, it sure is exactly what routine brings, security and comfort.

May your routine over this Christmas time include boredom and monotony to the outside but bring you peace and security on the inside.

They will teach simple but effective DIY measures that could keep your home warmer and reduce your bills.
















Popies On The Green

Four Popes Buried in St Mary's Churchyard

There are four Popes buried at St Mary's – not on a one-way ticket from the Vatican, but there is a small Roman Catholic connection anyway. They are in one brick vault close to the corner of the churchyard where the alley from the High Street meets Pembroke Road. It's topped with a massive slab, and it used to have an inscription but it's now illegible.

Richard Shackleton Pope was one of 19th-century Bristol's most influential architects, born in 1792. At first he worked mostly in the classical style, and he was responsible for designing some of the best-known buildings in the city. They include St Mary on the Quay (now Roman Catholic) church on Colston Avenue, the Royal Western Hotel whose façade is still standing near the Council House, the old gaol (now gone), probably Vyvyan Terrace in Clifton, and certainly a huge dockside warehouse, now the Arnolfini. He could also "do" Gothic, as in the Buckingham Baptist Chapel in Queens Road, Clifton, and St James's Priory Roman Catholic church in the city centre. He had no known commissions in Shire.

These Popes were not celibate – at least, not all of them. The other three in the grave are all Richard's children: **Richard Tyrrell, Thomas Shackleton** and **Sarah Lawrence Pope**. In the 1871 census

they are all aged between 30 and 40, all unmarried and living with Richard Shackleton in what the census unhelpfully calls "The Village". I haven't been able to identify the house for sure, but it must have been near **The Wylands** before the present house was built.


Richard Tyrrell was a medical student, then a surgeon, who was no longer practicing in 1861 or 1871 – perhaps ill health was a factor, since he died aged 41 in 1873. He was the first Pope in the grave, followed by his 92-year-old father in 1884. Thomas was an architect like his father, and spent some of his working life in practice with him. Together they created **Gloucester Street in Clifton** and the arches for culverting the river Frome in the city centre. By himself Thomas was a church restorer, but he also designed what is now **Canynge Hall of Bristol University** in Whatley Road. He moved to Clifton, then Westbury Park, but died and came to St Mary's

for the last time in 1909. Their sister Sarah lived in Westbury in later life but was buried here in 1903, having previously lived with and looked after the old man, who seems to have been bereaved quite young. His wife Susan was living in 1838, but is not recorded as buried here. Where Richard and Susan were at the 1841 census is a mystery. Richard was a widower in 1851.

Richard Shackleton Pope may have been gifted and versatile, but he wasn't the most popular of Bristol's architects in his time. He was one of the two district surveyors for the city, and he is widely thought to have used his position to the advantage of his own practice, notably when he won the competition to design the **Assize Courts** in Small Street in 1867.



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
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The Strange An original story by Gil Osman

It has been a great honour to receive a congratulatory card with good wishes from H.M. King Charles III and Queen Camilla in recognition of this very special occasion.




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
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City and Port of Bristol **Bowling Club**

Cyclocross Comes to Kingsweston

October saw the Kingsweston Estate hosting the exciting sport of Cyclocross for the first time.



This event was organised by Bristol CX, a local cycling club, with the help and support of Bristol City Council and the Kingsweston Action Group. It formed part of the Western Cyclocross League calendar, complementing other events in Bristol (Netham Park and Stoke Park), Cheltenham, Stroud, Winchcombe and Frome. The activity itself can be considered to be a cross between road cycling and mountain biking, with the bikes looking more like road bikes to the casual onlooker. Such steeds are not as robust as mountain bikes hence it is not uncommon to see riders dismounting and carrying their bikes when the going gets tough.

The course used both the main field of **Kingsweston Estate**, circling around the trees and hugging the bushes, before the challenge of climbing up through the woods and crossing into **Shirehampton Park**. The course crossed back into the Estate by the **Shirehampton Road car park**, with the riders having to negotiate some barriers requiring dismounting to pass through.

The event drew participants from as far away as west Wales and of all ages. Over 30 were under 12 years old, making it a great activity for families and people of all abilities. The racing was well received by the visitors to the estate with the organisers ensuring that those exercising or dog walking were inconvenienced as little as possible. A lot of thought went into the design of the course including marshalled crossing



points. As well as drawing a sizeable contingent of spectators, many dog walkers stopped to watch the racing and were very complimentary about the organisation and choice of venue.

The location was praised for its stunning views of the features of **Avonmouth**, the River Severn and South **Wales**, as well as the great selection of beverages and cakes supplied by **Morgan's Coffee House**.

Winners of the events included Bristol based exprofessional cyclist **Si Richardson** taking first place in the Seniors (23-39 year olds), with local based winners dominating the other categories, in particular the Women's races.

Feedback from the general public and regular visitors to the estate was very positive with some suggesting that more use of both Shirehampton Park and the Kingsweston Estate should be made with such interesting events.

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
