

The Friends of Shirehampton Library

Things are in full swing again now and our weekly activities are progressing well. The Shire Living Room takes place on Tuesday afternoons from 3pm till 5pm and all folk are welcome. We have tea/coffee/squash and biscuits, all free, for anyone who wants to pop in for a chat, keep warm, maybe play a board game with others, even browse through the great wealth of books and magazines available there. Families are welcome after school, we now have Storytime for any children who'd like to be read to.

Our Wednesday IT Literacy Class from 6pm till 7pm has gone so well we now have folks who are confident enough to progress on their own. This means we have some availability if anyone would like to come along, so do pop along if you fancy, or, if you have a friend or relative who you think it might benefit, bring them along. We have a team of experts at hand to take you through all the basics of a computer/tablet/smartphone and get you going.

Our Family History Group meets once a month on the 2nd Thursday of each month from 6pm till 8pm. Again, we have a team of Genealogists who can guide you through the basics. All you need is a Family name, a date and place of birth, and you can get started. The library has two new computers now with access to the **Ancestry.com** website and this is a huge boon.

We have a couple of ideas we're looking into:

- A Library of Things. This is holding a store of household items, eg a Drill, Lawnmower, BBQ perhaps, even an Apple Press, ie items which you may not use often enough to merit buying. We would loan these out to local folks for a short time.
- A Record Listening Group. The Bristol Library Service have the equipment to play Vinyl records and would be happy to provide them at the library on occasion. Perhaps we could get a few folks to sit and chat about a classic album from the past.

Finally, we're pleased to announce another event, this time a repeat of the **Richard Coates talk**, author of the superb **Shirehampton Sketches** book. The last talk Richard gave was so popular, we've decided to hold another for those who were unable to get in, or who'd like to attend anyway. This time the event will be at the **Cotswold Community Association, Dursley Road, BS11 9XH, on Tuesday 29th November at 7pm**. Admission will be on a First Come, First Served basis. There will be refreshments and donations will be welcome.

An Update from Darren Jones MP, Bristol North West

The days are getting shorter, and winter is on the way. I know that many of you will be worried about making ends meet, with a cost-of-living crisis and an energy crisis to think about. We won the argument in Westminster to help cap the price of energy this winter, but the average amount we'll pay is still double what it was a year ago.

People should not be faced with an impossible choice between heating and eating. When we are being charged the Earth for energy the only action we can take as individuals is to use less energy. That was the idea behind my recent **'Charge the Earth Summit'**.

With a live demo on laying loft insulation, quickfire talks on everything from energy debt advice to how to adjust your boiler settings to make it run more efficiently, there was a strong emphasis on practical support. I hope the event will have helped many people to reduce their energy bills.

Using less energy is also what we need to do to reduce our greenhouse gas emissions to achieve

climate targets, and the implications for the climate crisis were also discussed throughout the day.

We filmed some of these talks and I will be sharing them once they have been edited, so please keep an eye on my website (**www.darren-jones.co.uk**) and Facebook page (**fb.com/darrenjonesmp**) for details.

In other local news, it was my privilege to open the memorial garden in Avonmouth, remembering the lives that were lost in the industrial explosion nearly two years ago. The ongoing investigation at the site, which is now drawing to an end, is the reason a temporary site has been processing waste material and this has caused an unwelcome smell for families living near to Avonmouth. **Wessex Water** has assured me that this temporary site will be moved in the coming months and that this will bring an end to the problem.

I'm also aware that we have a number of property planning issues in the village, which seems to have become a hotspot at the moment given the higher values local houses are now being sold and rented for. I have raised these issues with **Bristol City Council** and will be asking for an enforcement officer to visit Shire in person soon.

Being your MP is a brilliant job like no other. With the help of my brilliant (but small!) team, we help local people with their problems, answer questions about local, national and international issues, and I represent your views in Parliament, too. CLIMATE CHANGE: Of Walking On Thin Ice

This time last year we were looking forward to COP 26. We hosted a talk and discussion about the importance of the conference in the Public Hall. A group of Climate Pilgrims, some from Shirehampton, walked the 'Camino to Cop' from London and Bristol to Glasgow. How different this year as the annual Cop conference draws near. This one will be held in Egypt and Alok Sharma will hand over the presidency. Our present government seems to intend to row back on the climate commitments made last year.

Nevertheless, in these dark times the **Pilgrims** walked again from **London to Bristol** bringing the film they made of the **Camino** with them. **Camino to Cop: Of Walking on Thin Ice** came to the

Encounters Film Festival in Bristol for its première in **September**. Several of us from **Shirehampton** met the walkers bringing the film and joined them as they carried the film to the Harbourside for its



first free open air 'walking screening'. They intend to distribute the film by foot across the country. You can find out more about the film and the walk at https://caminotocop.com.

Just a few days after watching this film SCEG attended Darren Jones's Charge the Earth **Summit**. The event opened with a panel discussion on the question "Will the government use the energy crisis to cop out on COP 26?" Three expert witnesses from Bristol University, Dr. Claire Gronow, Environmental Scientist, Dr. Ed Atkins, Senior Lecturer in Human Geography, and Professor Daniela Schmidt, School of Earth Sciences, reminded us that we MUST urgently REDUCE our carbon emissions if we are to survive as a species. Professor Schmidt said the planet would survive the extreme changes that are coming, but said starkly "Human beings cannot live in temperatures of 50C ", temperatures we have already seen across the globe.

The **positive news** is that we have renewable energy and we **CAN** reduce our carbon emissions, **AND** our energy. In Case You Missed It? **GET READY FOR BRISTOL'S CLEAN AIR ZONE**

Bristol City Council will be introducing a Clean Air Zone on Monday 28 November 2022 to reduce harmful pollution from vehicles. Poor air quality has a major impact on the health of everyone in the city and the Clean Air Zone will help us tackle this issue and meet government targets for cleaner air in 2023. The zone is in the central area where air quality is poorest. No vehicles will be banned from driving in the zone, but older and more polluting vehicles will have to pay a daily charge to drive in the zone.

71 per cent of vehicles already meet the zone's emission standards. The council is offering financial support and advice to help people upgrade their vehicles or switch to a cleaner way of travelling.

All contact details and information about how to send us articles, announcements and letters are included. If you would like to advertise in Shire, visit the website and you can find out how.


We have also included a **donations page**; this can be used if you would like to **make a contribution to Shire**, whether you are including an article or wish to **help support this community newspaper**.



We are all invited to the Quiz Night on Friday 28th October at 7:45pm at Lawrence Weston Social Club. Everyone is welcome.



hen the twins had 'escaped' from the house, The Strange waited to see if the village children would accept them, as they looked normal. They were pleased to see them playing happily splashing in puddles with the other toddlers. Global Warming Widening Reach of Tickborne Diseases Across Europe

Climate change is causing the geographical expansion of disease-carrying ticks and tiger mosquitoes, leading to outbreaks of rarely seen diseases in some European countries including the UK, according to a report written by the University of the West of England (UWE Bristol). The report, which looks at the global spread of zoonotic diseases and the link to climate change, was recently published by the Department of the Environment in the EU.

Written by the **Science for Environment Policy** team at the **University's Science Communication unit (SCU)**, the research highlighted how over the last two decades, tick-transmitted diseases such as Lyme disease, tickborne relapsing fever, tick-borne encephalitis and Crimean Congo haemorrhagic fever viruses have continued to increase in frequency and range across Europe.

This is in part due to climate change creating longer mild seasons when the ticks are active and the broadening of their geographic range northwards into previously colder regions, and up to higher altitudes.

For example, Borrelia miyamotoi, the organism that can cause some tickborne diseases, has now been observed in numerous European countries including the UK, Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, France, Germany, Netherlands, Norway, Poland, Romania, Sweden and Switzerland. A bite from the infected tick can lead to diseases including tickborne relapsing fever.

Nicola Shale, who is a science writer in the SCU and is co-author of the report, said: "Borrelia miyamoti can occur with lyme disease and other tick-borne infections – such as the blood parasite babesia – resulting in unusual symptoms, meaning it is under reported.

"Clinicians in the UK and other European countries might not have heard of Borrelia miyamoti, or the blood parasite Babesia, yet these human pathogens are present in some ticks in the UK. Healthcare systems therefore need to be primed for patients presenting with new zoonotic diseases, as climate change causes novel pathogens to become more prevalent in northern European countries."

Global warming is also contributing to the increasing occurrence of tiger mosquitos across Europe, leading to malaria re-emerging in Greece, West Nile virus emerging across parts of Eastern Europe, as well as dengue fever in Croatia and chikungunya in France. Shale said: "The spread of the invasive tiger mosquito across Europe is particularly concerning, as they are more competent vectors for more dangerous pathogens than the native European species of mosquito."

The report found that the increasing frequency of epidemics and pandemics (including Covid-19) since 2000 has been linked to the same global environmental changes driving biodiversity loss and climate change. The majority of emerging diseases (e.g. Ebola, Zika) and almost all known pandemics are caused by microbes of animal origin (and are therefore called 'zoonoses'). And it warned that the more we have contact with wildlife and livestock, the more likely these microbes may 'spill over' to humans.

However, land use change, agricultural intensification and expansion, wildlife trade and consumption are all increasing wildlife/human contact. The global demand for meat in poorer nations by developed nations, for instance, is leading to unsustainable farming practices and land clearance – ultimately contributing to increased pandemic risk.



Shale said: "The research highlights the interconnectedness of human and environmental health and raises awareness around health threats posed by practices such as buying exotic pets. For example, Monkey Pox first emerged in the west, in the US in 2003, and was traced back to a shipment of Gambian pouched rats sold as pets. It also helps provide more in-depth knowledge of the environmental drivers of disease, to nudge people towards better environmental stewardship."


The report also referred to the **One Health High Level Expert Panel (OHHLEP)**, convened in 2021 by the **World Health Organization (WHO)** to provide policy-relevant science on health with regard to human/animal interaction. In particular, the panel is looking to create guidance on a long-term strategic approach to reducing the risk of zoonotic pandemics, with an associated monitoring and early-warning framework.






Finally, on **Thursday** of that week, we all dressed up as what we would like to be when we grow up. What a wide range of career choices
