

4. Ideas: If you have any ideas of way to make *the Big Clean* more successful then please do not hesitate to let me know.



Part of the *Social Justice Hub at St Andrews Church in Avonmouth*, Space4Makers is a wood workshop which runs daytime sessions for adults, Monday to Thursday. CPR and Defib Training at the Cotswold

We had two sessions in September in how to perform CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) and how to use a Defibrillator. *Simon Brookes*, a retired Marines instructor, is passionate about having as many defibrillators with 24 hours access as possible in the community. He has raised funds relentlessly and there are now 57 installed around Bristol, thanks to him and his charity Defibs4Bristol.com.

We had two sessions, a daytime one, for those not at work, and an evening one. Both were extremely well attended and gave over 50 people an opportunity to understand the simple techniques needed to possibly keep a person, who may have had a cardiac arrest, alive in those vital minutes before an ambulance arrives. Several of the audience had a go at practising compressions on a dummy, while the rest of us chanted along to the **Bee Gees "Staying Alive!"**.

There are several Defibrillators in Shirehampton, at the Lamplighters pub, outside the Public Hall, the George Inn and the Co-op in the High Street. There is also a Bleed Kit outside Paul Wood Butchers, also in the High Street. If you see any CPR training advertised, I'd highly recommend attending, it could be a family member, a neighbour, or a passer-by, who's life you might help to prolong.

An Update from Darren Jones MP, Bristol North West

It was more than two hundred years ago that the lane connecting Kings Weston and Henbury was converted into a turnpike road - the road we now know as Kings Weston Road. Since then, the horse-drawn carts travelling on the road have been replaced with not only cars, but also Heavy Goods Vehicles (HGVs) and double-decker buses.

I'm thankful the **Kingsweston Iron Bridge** reopened last year to offer a safe crossing point, but I still don't like to see HGVs heading down this narrow road. The road was never built for such big and heavy vehicles, which should instead use the Portway or the M5 to reach the Avonmouth industrial estate. And many of you will recall that it was a series of collisions involving HGVs that caused the damage to the bridge. The bridge was raised as part of the repair works to allow HGVs to comfortably pass underneath, but there are other safety concerns with HGVs using this road, as well as the potential for a lorry to end up getting stuck and blocking the road. We saw this happen a few months ago, with Kings Weston Lane blocked for many hours by an HGV and a doubledecker bus on a corner by Kings Weston House that was too tight for both vehicles to pass. Just like Kings Weston Road, this section of Kings Weston Lane up the hill is also ill-suited to HGVs. Several constituents commented on Facebook posts about this incident, saying they thought there should be a weight limit on

this road. However, there is already a 7.5-tonne weight limit in place for this section of Kings Weston Lane, from the roundabout where Kings Weston Lane crosses Long Cross up the hill to where it joins Kings Weston Road. But given how HGVs are sometimes seen on the road, I can understand if people were unaware of this! My team has been in touch with Councillor Don **Alexander** about improving the weight limit signage. Enforcing the weight limit is, of course, a police matter, and I plan to raise this with Clare Moody, the Police and Crime Commissioner for Avon & Somerset. In addition to this, I'd like to see sat nav devices display a warning to drivers that Kings Weston Road and this section of Kings Weston Lane is not suitable for HGVs. I have contacted the companies TomTom and Garmin about this, which I understand are popular navigation devices among HGV drivers. I'll keep you informed with how this progresses.

In other news, I shared in last month's issue that I'm launching a new series of 'In conversation with...' events in the constituency. The first event is about



opening up arts and culture opportunities for the many not just the few, and this event will be held on the afternoon of Saturday, 8th November (please note the date change) at a venue in or close to Shirehampton. Walking Into The DARK Nature Nites

November, and the Celtic season of Samhain – a time of moving into darkness as the sun sinks lower and lower in the sky and the nights grow longer and longer. It's a time to hunker down and lie low till the sun begins to return. Samhain is a time for 'getting rid of dead wood', for letting go of what no longer helps us and waiting for things to change. But will changes in our everyday world be for the better?

The Climate Crisis as an issue having been pushed off the front pages and instead we see headlines suggesting politicians and corporations are considering abandoning carbon cutting projects. Yet we also see headlines about more and more damaging wildfires, stronger and more destructive storms. We prepare for floods and downed trees in our own streets and gardens. As we gather fallen leaves perhaps we ask ourselves again what change is needed now to help preserve and protect the natural world. What else can I do?

Well, Shirehampton Action supported work on the Community Garden in Pembroke Avenue in early October with boxes of plants for volunteers to plant out. Everyone is welcome to help build and maintain the garden. Shire Action also organized a free foraging hedgerow walk with **Steve England** in October. Nature Detectives Appeal

A new community nature project is launching in **Shirehampton this January –** and it needs your help.

Nature Detectives will run once a month and offers a chance to slow down, explore, and discover the natural world right on our doorstep. The sessions are free, family-friendly, open to all ages, and no experience is needed.

The idea came directly from Shirehampton Action's Climate and Nature Plan, which highlighted the need for more family-friendly nature activities in the area. The project has been set up by Cee MacDonald (pictured). Cee is part of Avon Wildlife Trust's Wildlife Champions programme, which encourages people to help their communities enjoy and connect with nature. Working Party at the Lily Pond

There were some herculean efforts put in over the last couple of months from a crowd of volunteers, over a dozen, and we managed to make serious restoration progress on the historic lily pond on Napier Miles Road. There were two objectives: firstly, the cutting down or rotting up of trees and vegetation that has grown to suffocate the pond and to enable a clearer survey of the condition of the pond walls and bottom.



Even after a long dry summer, it was a surprise to find no open water at all in the pond tank! The vegetation has acted to soak up much more water than would be usual and the group was relatively firm across the whole area.

The target to cut and remove the vegetation was only just met by the end of the day, the hot conditions meaning volunteers tired quickly despite the great turnout. The waste was lifted to the pond edges and stacked in existing piles of debris up and away from the water line. Sadly, there was little sign of any of the 49 individual native pond species recorded here in 2012 as part of our Bioblitz. There were two types of reeds, sporadic water lily plants, some froglets and



an invasion of sallow trees, but nothing that indicates a thriving environment.

Initial review showed the original hydraulic lining applied to the pond walls has dried and begun disintegrating, allowing water to leak away around the edges. We dug a small trial hole to establish the depth and condition of the lining of the pond. Digging down through an astonishing 18 inches of black sloppy rotting organic matter, we encountered the original clay bottom of the pond. In the area inspected, this looked to be in a decent wet condition, but where areas dry out in the summer, any cracked clay base or root damage will also be letting the water leak away. The hole we dug filled with water during the afternoon, showing that even though it looks like a field right now, the water is still close to the surface.

A quick calculation suggests there are around 350 cubic metres of mud needing cleaning out to start restoration of the pond lining. This could equate to about 340 tons of black gunk that need removing from the pond!

We're grateful too for the incredibly positive reaction to this work and the kind words of support we've received: more than for any other project we've undertaken on the estate.

History On Our Doorstep - Kings Weston Roman Villa

On Saturday 27th September I took the opportunity to visit Kings Weston Roman Villa in Lawrence Weston. It was a family open day and it was some years when I last visited.

I noticed there was work ongoing and the old mosaics that had been made by local school children that were on display had crumbled away due to the weather elements over the years.

I met my friend Grant who had been involved in a local school project around 20 years ago and on the information display boards, was one of several students in the photographs. The mosaic floor inside the wooden building was just as I remembered it and the sandstone walls continued to be well preserved. Imagination took over to how it would have looked in Roman times. I met with Kate Iles, Senior Curator of Archaeology for Bristol Museums to find out what work was being carried out to preserve the site. "It's quite exciting actually because we have just begun our first major bit of conservation since it was discovered in 1947. It was conserved in the early 50s when the Roman walls were set with cement so that it could be left on open display, but we are now finding that this cement is so hard, it's driving the water and the weeds through the Roman stone. We are working




with a specialist conservator team called Clifton Conservation and they are helping us to remove the 1950s cement so that we can replace it with a much softer mortar that will help the stonework breathe and replacing that mortar with some of the original Roman stone mortar that we have in store. "The stonework inside is not subject to the same issues of the weather as outside. The mosaics inside were sent to a specialist mosaic repairing company not long after discovery. They were set in modern cement and put back into the floor and that's how you see them today. "It's really important to preserve history. This is the only surviving Roman villa in Bristol and it's an amazing resource, so we're really keen to preserve it for now and also for future generations. If we don't it will be lost forever". Said Kate.

There was plenty of activities to take part in, stories to be told and a mulsum drink to try. There were plenty of visitors too, fascinated by their surroundings and stories being told of Roman life.

History Galore!

Mid-September saw a couple of fascinating history-themed events in the Shirehampton area. First, *Bristol's Brilliant Archaeology Day at Blaise Castle* on Saturday 13th September was a wonderfully entertaining celebration of local history, organised and attended by a variety of the region's clubs and societies, including the *Spelaeological Society* (for cave-explorers), *Bristol and Avon Archaeological Society, Cotswold Archaeology* and the *Young Archaeologist's Club*, all eager to recruit new enthusiasts.

Panels summarised some of the knowledge we have gained from these groups' activities, for example on **Iron Age** sites on **Blaise Hill** and **Roman** life around the **Severn Estuary**. Outside on the lawns were demonstrations of weaving, pot-making and medieval music as well as stalls displaying cooking implements and typical food and drink during the **Middle Ages**. Meanwhile warriors in period costumes re-enacted swordfights and youngsters could try out their archery skills. There was much to be learned and plenty of laughter.

A torrential rainstorm on the following Sunday didn't deter people from flocking to **Kings Weston House**, which opened to the public as part of Bristol's annual

Open Doors Day. It was a rare opportunity to look inside this unique 18th-century Georgian mansion on Shirehampton's doorstep, crammed full of elegant antique furniture and historic paintings. Guides from the Kings Weston Action Group (KWAG) led informative and well-attended tours of the ground floor throughout the day, narrating the history of the house and pointing out some of its noteworthy features.

Highlights included the picture gallery and the monumental staircase. If you missed this event, there will be another opportunity at Open Doors next year.



The Methodist Church Celebrate Their 150th Anniversary by Kathryn Courtney

July 2025 marked the 150th Anniversary for Shirehampton's Methodist Church. They held an anniversary service on 20th July and on the 22nd July held a two hour exhibition on it's history in the village. There was also a free barbeque and cream teas. The church itself had displays exploring the church history and there was an ongoing arts and crafts activity too.

One visitor was Toby Stride who's family had a long association from the 1870's with the building of the church and attending services on a regular basis. "I was at Sunday school from the age of three or four and one of the things I got was to do the collections for the JMA." (The Junior Methodist, Junior Missionary Association.)

"You'd get a little book and get various relatives and friends to sign up to pay you weekly fixed amount, a penny or threepence or sixpence occasionally, a share. It was collecting money for missions abroad and you would go round on a Sunday morning collecting your money and hand it in on Sunday. At the end of the year they'd tot up how much you'd collected and if you collected more than five pounds in a year, which is quite a lot then, you'd get a medal for your first year and then you'd get a bar in the subsequent years. So I had bars for 1966/67/68. When you filled up your medal you'd get a new medal and could start again. I did that for a number of years."

Toby no longer lives in Shirehampton but met **Dot** who had one of the medals he spoke of. "It's been lovely to see the exhibition and the building, see the changes. I left before they'd sold off the land at the back for development. I remember the old cinema seats that were very comfy with a very particular feel to them because they were all velvet with brass handles at the end of the pew which would go up and down. It was a much grander set of church buildings when I was here but generally much more basic. All the floors were plain pine wood and it's nice to see the changes."

There were old photos of Christenings and Weddings, historical photos of the church, events held, people, how the church has become eco aware and dementia friendly.

Deputy Lord Mayor Cllr Andrew Varney was a guest at the event and like many visitors that day, enjoyed his time there. Thank you to everyone involved in making the exhibition a special event.

Here's to the next 150 years.

"The Women Who Built Bristol"

Author talk at Shirehampton Public Library

In September, we were very privileged to have the author, *Jane Duffus*, visit us to give a talk at the Public Library about the second volume of her book "The Women Who Built Bristol".

This concise book details briefly the lives of 250 women of different backgrounds from the 17th century to the present day who shaped life in Bristol and for those around them. The book is not only about women who achieved great things such as pioneering engineers and doctors but also includes the extraordinary, ordinary women who most of us can relate to. It is about women who have any tangible connection to the city whether they were just born, lived or died here but the criteria to be included in the book is that they must be dead!

So many extraordinary women have been hidden from history and nameless, such as the 19th century authors having to use a male pen name to have their work taken seriously - Mary Ann Evans who published under the name of George Elliott comes to mind. I particularly like that the author has named 'real' ordinary women who have shaped people's lives, even in the smallest of ways. I loved hearing about a young factory worker who had taught herself to read and write. When she went to the cinema to watch the silent movies, she was able to read out the on-screen texts to help the people around her who were unable to read understand the films! The author has also shown a round picture of society and included the not so good in society too, who fortunately are a few - that somehow shaped Bristolians' lives and society - such as a serial baby killer, whose legal case changed the law concerning baby farming and adoption.

The book has beautiful illustrations of some of the women and it is a lovely book to dip intoand **Shirehampton** gets a mention too! Through the lives of the women, we learn of how Bristol developed from the 17th century to the modern day.

"The Women North Bristol Foodbank

On Saturday 25th August St. Andrews Church in Avonmouth held a fundraising event for the Bristol North West Foodbank. There was a stall selling new items for the home, kitchen, pet care and children's toys. In another room there were a number of stalls with plenty to choose from including additional homeware, books, toys and accessories that were colour coded from £1 to £7. Cake and refreshments were on hand.

The Food Bank was originally set up in 2011 by Emma Murray who continues to manage it. "We have grown a lot since we first opened where we had two small cabinets. The North West Food Bank is massive now and we're helping about 9,000 people at year with emergency food. We now have five food bank outlets that we serve from here. Hotwells, Henbury, Severn Beach, Lawrence Weston and Avonmouth. We manage all the volunteers and we provide all the food and toiletries so people can pick up their food from there. We have a clothes bank on site for adults and children and shoes as well for every age."

"We have two full-time advice workers who are working to deal with people's issues and the root causes of why they might be coming to the food bank. We're also able to refer them on for debt help. We do food bank cookery courses and budgeting too, a couple times a year. We also have 'Space for Makers' woodworking workshop which is doing courses for adults and for children from our most deprived areas that we serve". Emma added.

I asked Emma where she sourced supplies. "Food donations come from the public in the main through Supermarket collection points. Businesses also have collection points giving us food all year round. Supermarkets also give their surplus food which is still able to be used and schools give at harvest time too. We're also very thankful to **Hovis** and **Warburtons** who give us fresh bread every week."

Things have definitely changed over the years. "During COVID we helped nearly 13,000 people. The cost-of-living crisis has just meant that we've got this ongoing need. It's not just people who are on benefits or low incomes. It's people who might have run their own businesses and then things go under. It might be





people who are on zero hours contracts, or have no back up or support, even domestic abuse. Whatever walk of life you're from, the food bank's here for you when life sends a curveball your way." said Emma

The Foodbank has been facing some funding issues where a few serious staffing changes have had to be made. **St. Andrew's Church** decided to hold a fundraising event to help them.

You may have noticed that Shirehampton Workman's Club has undergone a number of changes. Gone is the workman's club old image including the men only bar that was prolific with many in years gone by

and its name has been revamped to 'Shirehampton Social Club'. A new image is now underway and is open to all including children, with many family orientated events being created including sports, entertainment and more. They are also community minded too having community events such as village fayres and private functions taking place.

I chatted with **John Scanlon** who is a Trustee and a Committee Member for Shirehampton Social Club to find out more.

"Times have changed and we have to change with the times too. Many of our original members have gone and there are new generations of people moving into Shire, many with families. We are trying to shake off our old image and create a more social, community-based environment where wives, daughters and children are welcome. Providing a venue that Shirehampton needs. A lot of businesses are closing down, there is the cost of living crisis too and challenges being faced by many".

"Of course, some people can sit in the bar for a nice quiet drink and have their own conversation and it is no longer a 'men only bar.' This is now a community club for people to socialise in. We have a large concert room where our entertainment nights happen usually on Saturday where talented singers and groups play. There is a dance floor in front of the stage so you can the night away".

"To a certain degree we are a family venue but children must be under parental guidance. It's mainly the concert hall we use for family events such as Hallow'een and Christmas for example. You can hire out the hall for christening's, wedding buffets, family parties, birthday

parties, and more. Many have been organised by club members and their families. Ideas are always welcome especially if it benefits the local community."

"We have a skittle alley, we have a snooker room and dart boards so if anyone wanted to get a team together for any of these we have the facilities you can use".

"Unfortunately, we are unable to serve hot food. We have looked into this but we don't have the space to make it viable let alone the costs involved, however we are very competitive with our drink prices. Even if you are not a member of the social club 10% is added to your bar bill. However, a year's membership is only £5 per adult which pays for itself and a Saturday Night is only £2.50 per person for a sociable entertaining night out".

I spent the evening with a friend of mine watching singer **Jodie Payne** entertain the audience. It was a great evening, very sociable and welcoming. The dance floor was in full use and during the break a fun game of bingo too. Definitely gets my recommendation.

Wells City v Avonmouth F.C.

At the start of play, Avonmouth sat 6th in the table, on 21 points. Wells City were 3rd on 24 points, having played three games more. It promised to be a finely balanced game.

Avonmouth Rugby Club Avengers Squad

Two years ago, the *Bristol Bears Community Foundation* initiated a project that aimed to make rugby accessible to children who, for various health and other reasons, could not train or play with squads of their peers. *Avonmouth Old Boys* was one of the clubs who partnered with the foundation in the project and thus was born "Avonmouth Avengers." The squad is made up of youngsters ranging from 8-16 years from Bristol, South Gloucestershire and North Somerset.

Attendance at sessions varies from 6-20 and focuses on skills training and fun activities. Sessions are noncompetitive and it was noticeable how supportive the children were of each other, shouting encouragement and sharing fun and laughter. Although the squad does not play competitive matches, there are two other similar squads in the area, one in **Kingswood** and one in **Cheddar**, so there is a seed of a plan to get the squads together to maybe play a friendly game towards the end of the season.





After stretching and warming exercises, the coaches, Lucy O'Brien and Mike Templar set up some fun drills using cones, tackle bags and a crash mat and there was passing practice.

Here's what some of the squad members had to say about the sessions:

- **Sharaat** said he liked the kicking, passing and catching practice.
- Annie-Shea said she liked everything but especially liked it if the after-training meal in the clubhouse happened to be chicken nuggets and chips.
- **Charlie** said that he liked all the activities.
- Flynn said "It's just fun. It gets you out and you make new friends."
- Aidan said he liked the warm-up exercises and the kicking and passing.







It was a heart-warming experience to watch the children having so much fun in a supportive and happy environment. Hats off to those people who sought to give these youngsters the opportunity to be active and to socialise with each other. The vehicle for the sessions is rugby, but the project is about much more than that; it's about spreading happiness and joy to youngsters who have more than their fair share of life's challenges.

Shirehampton Sailing Club Defies the Mud – Will You Join Us?

In our small club-house near the Lamplighters Pub, there hangs this photo. Recognisable to club members are *John Coxhill*, one-time Commodore, *Bob Hayes* the long-time Secretary, and *Ken Darters*. They are doing what passers-by will see every Saturday morning, rain or shine, summer, and winter – Slip Crew, 9am-12pm with a break for tea – hosing down the slip and using brushes and our *Big Bertha* to do the ultimately futile, pushing the mud back out to sea for another week of sailing.

The boaties among you will know that the Severn Estuary has the second-largest tidal range in the world, the highest range being in Newfoundland in Canada. Spring tides can be up to 14.5 metres in height, with neap tides still around 9 metres. For comparison, the Solent is 4.5 metres and Falmouth is a mere 1.4 metres. The reason for this is the shape and size of the Severn Estuary. Twice a day, the double tidal bulge races round the planet, which means that when the tide is incoming, the Severn Estuary has to fill up completely with water in six hours from low tide to high tide. The Severn Estuary however narrows very quickly, so the same volume of water which just rolls along the English Channel between England and France, entering the Bristol Channel, the narrowing into the Severn forces the water to rise much higher. As the tidal bulge passes, the water then must completely empty out again in the next six hours before the second, slightly smaller, tidal bulge, making the Severn Estuary fill up again.

So, at our little slip at **Shirehampton**, the water covers the slip with mud twice a day. Over the course of a week, the mud layers build up, so by the next weekend, there is a good foot depth of mud to clear away, so that sailors and canoeists and rowers (and local kids) can stroll down the slip without slipping over.

The other photo shows **John, Ken and Bob** on a day when we trialled a jet-washer and decided that on fuel grounds alone, operating a jet washer would be too expensive (£600 a year to be precise) to operate – even before the insurance.

So, this is where you come in. Would you like to join us in defying the mud? Maybe once a month you could come down, perhaps helping initially on our very powerful hose, or brushing mud, or wading out on the bank to shape a channel so that the mud can drain naturally and not pond up. The company is good – this is our happy place after all – and you get to come inside the club house and enjoy a proper tea break with cake.





If you like sailing, we will take you out for free, or perhaps you'd like a go in our rowing gig, or borrow one of our canoes.

The Mystique of the Mask

One of the peculiarities of fencing is the mask. Outside of motor sport and ice hockey goalkeeping, it's unique. Ancient Egyptian wall painting show fencers using sticks and wearing what look like wicker masks, but masks came into European fencing in the late Eighteenth Century. The early versions were flimsy, but the conventions of fencing were strict and foil fencing was becoming, increasingly an art and less a training for combat.

As a reaction and to meet the needs of prospective duellists, epee came along. Heavier weapons and stiffer blades needed stronger masks and with the military sabre - a cutting weapon - more padding was needed.

The modern mask, safe, comfortable and allencompassing gives a particular aspect to fencing. It gives a kind of anonymity and takes away a lot of the animosity from what was once a sort of fight.

Many of us, who might feel inhibited about being out on the fencing strip ("the piste"), don't feel that way, cocooned in our masks. A couple of decades ago, there was a move to introduce transparent masks; to show the fencer's face for TV and improve visibility. It didn't last. We like the mask. Perhaps we like the distance that gives a dream quality to the match or maybe, like music, it creates a medium between the outer and inner worlds, blurring the difference.
