SHIRE PUBLIC INFO FOR JANUARY

From Bristol City Council

Like many of you, we very much welcome the Pfizer/BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine. We are now working closely with health partners to ensure our high priority groups (care home staff and residents, health and social care workers and over-80s) will be prepared to receive the vaccine in the coming days and weeks. You will have seen the fantastic news that vaccinations have started at Southmead Hospital. It is one of 50 hospital hubs operational across the country. 98-year-old Jack Vokes was the first person to receive the vaccination in Bristol.

The vaccine offers some light at the end of the tunnel after a tough year, but rollout will be a marathon not a sprint, so it's important that we don't let our guard down now.

Plans are also underway for the launch of rapid COVID-19 testing in Bristol. We are taking a targeted approach to identify and break the chains of transmission. Our plan will identify who to test and how regularly, focusing on city areas and settings with high infection rates.

Two New COVID-19 Test Sites

Two new drive-through mobile testing units opened at Hengrove Leisure Park and in the Computershare car park on Bridgwater Road. Testing sites operational in the city now include:

- Rear of Victoria Rooms
- Netham Park
- Hengrove Leisure Park
- Brislington Park and Ride
- Computershare car park on Bridgwater Road.

Keep Your Home Ventilated this Winter

Did you know that letting fresh air into indoor spaces can reduce the risk of infection from coronavirus by over 70%? Coronavirus lingers in spaces with no fresh air, increasing the risk of people breathing in infected particles. This risk can be reduced significantly



by regularly ventilating enclosed areas. In addition to keeping your distance from others and washing your hands, allowing fresh air into enclosed areas will help reduce the spread of the virus.


All museums in Bristol are now closed in line with government guidance and we will review our reopening plans in February.

Update from Shirehampton Public Hall

Having survived the first lock down with all the ramifications of groups not being able to meet, physical activities and social events not happening has had a profound effect on those who have used the Hall for many years.

Coming out of the first lock down it was hoped that things would start to get back to how they were. But, with the second lock down so soon it has not been possible to regain momentum and recoup usage or income. As with all other charities and community groups the Hall has had to meet its ongoing financial commitments and support staff who are so important to the Hall.

Although the Hall may be closed, there is still work going on behind the scenes, with the small group of Trustees regularly meeting and working to keep things going in the moment whilst planning for the future. The trustees would like to say a big *thank you* to those who were able to make a donation via the **Just Giving Page**, especially during this recent period when donations were matched funded by Just Giving. The Just Giving Page still continues so any donations are greatly appreciated.

To the future, the Trustees have been developing plans to make improvements to the Hall (see attached draft plans) as the original plans were rejected by the planners. To this end outline planning permission has been given. Your comments would be welcome.

The aim is to future proof the Hall by making it a great community resource and an excellent performance venue. To do this we wish to, install extra toilets downstairs, outside of the main hall, so events in the hall won't by interrupted by other users. Bringing the office downstairs will mean the staff are more accessible. Negotiation is underway with the Library service for the return of library staff room to improve accessible space for those with mobility problems.

The railway club, one of the longest standing users of the Hall, have been very helpful and positive about resiting their club room to facilitate the changes.

The upgrade to the Hall to make it a good

performance area is being actively pursued. Edyta Lang, one of the Trustees, has accessed grant funding to upgrade the sound system and improve internet coverage in the building.

The ability to directly serve refreshments from the proposed bar/kitchen area, we feel will be welcomed by potential users.


We are also hoping to reverse some of the less attractive features, returning the Hall to its appearance in line with the period it was built. A major step is being undertaken by **Bristol City Council** in replacing the hall roof in early 2021, which will help make the building water tight.

To implement the plans set out by the Trustees will require a large fundraising effort. We are a small group of Trustees, (just 4) and, whilst we will do all in our power to raise the funds, we would welcome assistance on fundraising, particularly from those with expertise in bid writing or those with transferable skills. Ideas and information on possible sources of funding would be welcomed. Does your employer give grants based on recommendations from their employees like you? Are you a member of an organization that would consider adopting us as the charity they support for a year?

We would also welcome people who shop at the Coop supporting us by having the Shirehampton Public Hall as the recipient of the charity element of the membership scheme. To do this, go to the Co-op Membership website at: www.coop.co.uk; scroll down on the home page to "Membership that makes a difference" and you will see all the local projects you can support this year - we obviously hope you chose us! Alternatively you can call the Co-op membership telephone line 0800 023 4708.

This, we hope, will be a time-limited project with a tangible outcome which will benefit the village for many years.

MYSTERIOUS STONES EXPLAINED

Dear Editor,

In KWAG's September newsletter there was a reference to the 'mysterious' masonry which came from the old Bristol Bridge when it was demolished. KWAG's newsletter states: "A frequent query we receive ask what are the big stones littered along the Lime Avenue and the Circle?"

I asked my father this as a boy in the 1940s and he replied that they were there to guide the American army vehicles during wartime blackouts. This was borne out by the fact that the stones were not littered along the approach road to Kings Weston House (as now) but carefully aligned along the left-hand side with scaffolding poles joining them together by being inserted into the holes made in the sides. Both stones and poles were still painted white to reflect the dimmed lights of the vehicles at night in wartime and prevent them crashing into trees or undergrowth. Of course, the army traffic could not enter the woods via the Penpole Lane (Wood) Lodge, because the carriage-way was only wide enough for pony-and-trap or small carriages - not much wider than the five-bar gate which still blocked the entrance. The army, therefore, made a new road from the one running through Shirehampton Park directly to the approach avenue leading to the house (i.e. where the current car-park is).

As for the stones' original purpose, that's a matter of guesswork.



CLIMATE IN JANUARY

A New Year and we all hope the world will be better, that the threat of Covid will recede and we'll be able to return to ... what? We all know we have to build a different way of life to mitigate the effects of climate change. A recent research report from Bristol University, *Bristol Public Opinion on Climate Change*, found that Bristolians are concerned about climate change and willing to make changes in their lives, but don't always know what action to take. It also found that we are thinking globally, concerned about climate devastation in far away places, not quite realizing that it's the warming climate that is bringing floods to places like Bristol and changing our seasons, causing food scarcity and higher prices.

We need detailed local action plans to help us make changes. We know the Council is asking us to switch to 'significantly more walking and cycling and to use zero carbon public transport.' Many residents are calling for more integrated and environmentally friendly transport networks in order to reduce car use and air pollution

Local community group Liveable Neighbourhoods is working to reduce traffic through residential areas. They would like to see traffic filters in suitable neighbourhoods to stop cars, vans and lorries using the streets as rat-runs. Residents would still be able to drive to their homes, and businesses would still get deliveries; pedestrians and bikes could get through freely. High streets in these areas could become attractive destinations where people want to spend their time and so footfall and trade would increase.

We can also do more to reduce carbon emissions by choosing low carbon foods. Many of us make New Year resolutions to lose a few pounds and eating more local, seasonal fruit and veg, and less meat and diary is a good way to do that, and at the same time help reduce carbon emissions. You can find out more about climate friendly eating on the Bristol Climate Hub, www.bristolclimatehub.org.uk. You can also attend the Oxford Real Farming Conference which is taking place online January 7th-13th. You can go to www.orfc.org.uk to book tickets for talks and discussions. Anyone can attend.

Finally, Bristol Airport is lodging an appeal against the refusal of its proposed expansion. If you think expanding an airport is not very helpful in a Climate Emergency, you can state your objections by writing to North Somerset County Council.

My Early Memories of Life in Shirehampton

By DAVID ELKINGTON

Recently I wrote to the Shire Newspaper about my parents' account of the return of the Great Britain. We lived on the Portway, immediately opposite Portway School (now pulled down and replaced by houses).

OTHER WAR-TIME MEMORIES:

The boys from Portway School used to look after the allotments immediately behind our house (now Tyning's Field, I believe) and if the Air Raid siren went off, they all dropped their gardening tools

and dived over the fence into our gardens and into the Anderson air raid shelters which some of us had. As five and three year olds we found it scary to be crammed into the shelter with

these very large lads, all taking refuge. Incidentally, that field was one of several which had been used in the First World War to accommodate the large number of horses that were then needed on the front line in France. One incidental result of this was that our gardens on the Portway produced remarkably sized vegetables! Our 'record-breaking' carrots were occasionally photographed for the Evening Post!

I remember too on another occasion when a captured German submarine was towed up the river to be displayed in the docks at Bristol. At Sea Mills School we were taken out to the playground from where we could see the river, the shipping, and on this occasion - the submarine. We had a large air raid shelter at school too and we would practise going out there wearing our gas masks. Over a certain age you had a black adult gas mask, but smaller children had a 'Mickey Mouse' gas mask which was red and a bit more fun.

After air raids we would go out into the roads and collect up any pieces of shrapnel from bombs and shells which had landed round about. One night my Dad who was an ARP warden was struck by a piece of shrapnel - fortunately protected by his helmet.

Up on the Shirehampton Park Golf Course we sometimes saw a huge crater where a bomb had landed and exploded.

During the war an American army camp was established at the Bristol end of the Shirehampton Park.

Sometimes there were buildings, houses or shops which were bombed - and so

weren't there any more – just a pile of rubble – like the pub, the Greyhound, I think, on the corner of the High Street and Park Road, almost opposite the Swimming Baths – now very sadly no more.

I am often asked "Were you frightened during the bombing?" Actually, no, air raids and bombing were an everyday event. The horror of war was experienced by older people, and luckily as children, most of us were unaware of it. We often heard bombs coming whistling down and then an explosion. During the day on one occasion my Mother, hearing an unexpected whistling grabbed

MEMORIES: me and pushed me to the floor, lying on top of me. I remember that occasion because it really hurt!

Did I know anyone who was killed or injured? Sadly, our next door neighbours' son, Billy, was in the RAF. In 1941 or 2 he had been flying on a sortie to

Germany, but when the plane got back to this country he was found to have died – the only one of his crew. You can see his name on the war memorial window above the entrance in St Mary's

Church, Shirehampton – Fl. Lt. W. Domaille.

[My late wife, then a child in London, had many more awful memories of the war in London, and was saddened so often when the children she had been playing with at school during the day were not there any more after the night's raids on the Capital]

The sirens in Avonmouth often went off - alerting the whole of north-west Bristol to an imminent raid - and we were woken up, taken out to the shelter, and there had to try to sleep on

the most remarkably uncomfortable bunks. It was dank and smelly down there, and the bunks...! We 'slept' on the bare wire of the bunk frames which should have been supporting the non-existent mattresses. The raids usually didn't last for that long, and we were relieved when the sirens sounded the 'All Clear' and we could get back indoors.

Every house had to aim not to let any light out during the night. In our house we had hardboard frames which were fixed against the downstairs windows in the evening, and removed in the morning. If you needed to get to another room you did so in the dark. Interestingly, bicycle handlebars were painted black to prevent any reflected light acting as a signal to enemy planes. I was still using my grandfather's

> black-handlebar bike until ten years after the war when I saved up enough money to buy a new one. The house windows were also protected with criss-cross patterns of sticky paper tape (Sellotape hadn't been invented). The

aim was to protect everyone in the room from flying glass if a bomb shattered the window.

One night a bomb landed on the pavement right outside our house. It was an incendiary bomb and so didn't explode, but my Mother ill-advisedly went out to try to put it out just as it burst into flames. Every fifth house in the street had been given a sandbag, a bucket and a stirrup pump to use against bombs and fire if needed. We were a fifth house and our air raid kit was kept on the landing outside the bathroom. [The stirrup pump was very useful in the garden, and when cleaning the car!]

My sister and I were in the air raid shelter that evening, and actually asleep, so were unaware of what was happening outside. Then, when the All Clear had sounded we were brought back indoors to find my mother all bandaged up and labelled (with a luggage label, attached to the policeman's cloak she had been wrapped in) to go off to hospital. I presume that neighbours looked after us that night, but I can't remember. Next day she returned complete with a white mask over all her face. (When the terrorist bomb happened in London in 2005, a casualty was pictured being taken across the road by a helper. The casualty had also been burned in the face and had exactly the same facial mask - It took me right back. Fortunately Mother recovered with not a lot of lasting damage.)

In February 1942 on a Sunday we had just finished dinner when we heard a plane flying extremely low – unusually low - overhead. Mother had run to the

window and shouted "It's a German!!" – "Don't be ridiculous," replied Dad, carrying on with his writing. But it WAS a German. I can clearly remember seeing the black and white Nazi crosses

on the underside of the wings. The plane was in trouble. It was coming down – missed our house by feet, struck a telegraph pole by the Woodwell Lane railway bridge which swung it round and then it disappeared down towards Avonmouth. There it crashed onto the Avon river bank with the loss of its two crew members.

When an air raid was on, and if it was safe for us to do so, we would go out of the back door and watch the anti-aircraft batteries at Ham Green and Avonmouth pick out the enemy aircraft with their search-lights. It was easy to distinguish the German from the British planes because of their very distinctive pulsating engine noise. I never saw any planes shot down at this time.

On one night in about 1942, Bristol suffered a terrible night of bombing. I remember being taken out to look at the sky over Bristol. The sky was red. An artist painted the scene and I will try to find the picture to show you.

On one occasion we went to visit my Grandparents in Southampton – and whilst there, a daylight raid was made on the port. My grandparents were out, and so we sheltered in their porch and watched planes fighting over the docks – and we could actually see the German planes dropping their bombs.

Whilst at school, all the teachers were women, since the men had all gone off to fight in the war. There was strict rationing, which meant that you were only allowed a small amount of anything – food, clothes, even sweets. Everyone – adults and children - had a ration book and, when you bought anything, a mark was made in the ration book to

show that you had used your allowance. Rationing lasted until well after the war. Fruit was in very short reply and most of us never saw a banana or a peach until 1946 at the earliest. The war ended in May 1945, and yet sweets were still on ration until 1952. All of us, even children, had an identity book. Interestingly, after the war, when the NHS came into being in 1947, they used our wartime ID numbers for our National Health numbers – and the last four digits of my NHS number are still those from my wartime ID card.

We didn't have holidays, just days out. For us in Bristol a big day out was invariably to Weston-super-Mare, but we didn't mind since we had no experience of the larger world. We might get one holiday per year – i.e. one day out per year! – BUT if we were very lucky we might get taken up to the Zoo for the day. That was a real treat.

In 1944 preparations were being made for D-Day when the allied forces of Britain, USA etc. got ready to invade Europe – hopefully by surprise. Although we didn't know it, vast

numbers of troops were being assembled near ports across the south of England to cross the Channel to Normandy. All down the Portway from a point near Horse-Shoe Bend (Probably even farther) all the way to Avonmouth Docks, military vehicles – often American - were parked down the road – hundreds of them. The soldiers of many nationalities would give us sweets, and we responded with cups of tea – then they were all gone. It must have been June 6th.

American children also sent us sweets – "candy" – which was very kind, though a box of candy didn't

really go very far in a primary school. It was nice of them to think of us.

After the end of the War, returning soldiers, sailors and airmen

would frequently be greeted with flags that adorned the fronts of their houses, together with a sign made by their children reading messages like – WELCOME HOME FRED.

When VE Day (May 8th 1945) happened, I remember that night being told that the war was over. "Do you mean that there won't be any more sirens? That we won't have to go down to the shelter again?" In fact we did have the sirens, which were now used by the Fire Brigade to call in the firemen when a blaze had started somewhere

– but we just had the All Clear siren. The Air Raid warning siren which had an up and down wail was not used again, though you sometimes hear it in war films. We celebrated with children's parties. Our Portway VE party was held in the playground of Portway School and was very jolly. Other smaller streets held their parties with tables laid out in the middle of the streets (there weren't many cars in those days). Then a few weeks later we repeated the process following the Victory in Japan – VJ Day. I found it somewhat confusing having two Victory parties so close together. [The process was repeated in 1953 following the Queen's Coronation].

All young men, when they reached the age of 18, were 'called up' to serve two years in the services. This was extended to cover the times that the country was still on alert for more possible war. Those


who strongly objected to fighting could apply to be 'conscientious objectors' and could spend two years working on farms or down the coal mines or other valuable work.

'National Service' did not come to an end in 1945 but went on finally until the early 1960's. In 1945 at the end of the war I was eight years old and so it was not until 1955 that I was called up. Young women could also serve in the forces but were not made to do so. Those with disabilities were not able to serve, but many of them helped with other jobs. Theoretically, you could choose whether to serve in the Navy, the Army or the Air Force but most had to join the Army unless you had taken precautions beforehand to be a volunteer reservist serviceman in the Navy or the Air Force. I had

luckily become a sea cadet whilst at school and then a volunteer sailor at HMS Flying Fox in Bristol, and so when I appeared before the Selection Board stating that I wished

to serve in the Royal Navy I was immediately taken into that service, and so began an amazing two years for me. Was it OK? Yes, I enjoyed it immensely (mostly) and lots of young men today would really benefit from experiencing two years away from home doing a job that is so different than any they might ever experience again. I must emphasize, however, that I did not experience the horrors of battle, which must have been so terrible and it is those who did – those men and women - who deserve our respect and thanks.




Shirehampton Primary- Reception Children Enjoy Clowning Around!

TO BE CASHLESS OR NOT TO BE CASHLESS?

To be cashless or not to be cashless? That is the question – and, I believe, the answer is not-to-be. Imagine the scenario – you're at the supermarket, your trolley laden with food and your card is declined. Is the supermarket going to say: "Don't worry, take your shopping and pop back in whenever and pay, then"? I doubt that very much. Currently, you have the alternative of paying with cash – in a cashless society you don't.



We would like to introduce ourselves and extend a very warm welcome to all residents of Shirehampton, and surrounding areas.





Petty Officer (SCC) Batt of Thornbury Sea Cadets decided to show his support for all nurses but especially his shipmate Lt (SCC) Sidwell RNR who is a practicing nurse. She one of the three Thornbury Sea Cadets' volunteer staff who are key workers.

At the end of the game there was a cooked meal, drinks and a rendition of the club song which starts 'We are the bowlers of the island'. So enjoyable was it that there was a second visit in 2018 and that was equally enjoyed and memorable.

At the end of all special away games and on tour it is traditional to invite the hosts back to Shirehampton for a six rink game. Island Bohemian only play friendly games a few times a season away from the island so it was an honour when they accepted the invitation and duly arrived in **Nibley Road on September 15th 2019**.

It was once again a great and memorable afternoon in the sun. There were some familiar faces, including **Guy Thorne**, who was the main contact when the first visit to Caversham was arranged, and others who were involved in the two games played on the island, all good bowling friends. Where will the next special day out take us? Watch this space!!

The club was saddened to hear that **Pete Gibson** who, with his **wife Gill**, has been a regular on Summer Tours in recent years, has passed away. Pete didn't bowl but was very much a part of the bowling family and will be missed by all who knew him.


