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Shirehampton Village Meeti

Around a hundred people filled the Public Hall September 28th for Darren Jones's first Village Meeting. Darren wanted to know how we feel about Shirehampton, what we value and what we think needs improving. The meeting was conducted as an open discussion with everyone given the opportunity to have their say.



Most people were concerned about the decline in the High Street and would like to see more independent shops, less litter and better traffic control. Last June concerned parents set up the Shirehampton Road Safety Group to monitor speeding along

Station Road and down the **High** Street. They called for volunteers to help the community speed watch gather information to prove that speeding is a real issue here.

Closed shops and rubbish in doorways speak of the decline in the High Street. People have been leaving 'donations' to charity shops in the doorways. This is little more than

unsightly fly-tipping since clothes left this way can not be re-used and must be destroyed.

These are visible signs of wider social problems. Alison Sowton, Vicar of St Mary's, said alcoholism is increasing in the streets. Shoplifting and attacks on shop staff are a serious problem. Vandalism and anti-social behaviour have been increasing.

On a more positive note some people spoke of the ordinary daily measures people are taking to improve our environment and reduce our carbon footprint in response to climate change. Residents love Shirehampton and appreciate its green spaces. They are proud of good primary schools and strong community relations, but everyone wants to halt the decline.





Bristol Babbers on Bikes!

In July 2023, two local girls, Michelle Armstrong and Zoe Edwards took on the mammoth challenge of riding from St Austell back to Bristol over three days. Over 200 miles in total! Why would anybody do this I hear you ask?! They were part of the fantastic group of people who come together every year to 'Ride for Precious Lives'.

Ride for Precious Lives raises money for the Asda Cribbs Causeway and they urge you to come wonderful Children's Hospice South West. Children's Hospice South West provides hospice care for children and families who live in the South West. The hospices are Charlton Farm in Bristol, Little Bridge House in Devon and Little Harbour in Cornwall. The care teams at these hospices look after children and young adults from age 0-21 who have life-limiting or life-threatening conditions from the point of diagnosis. They also support their families.

This year, Michelle and Zoe have recruited two other riders, Amanda Belgium and Stacey Tudor. Together they make up The Bristol Babbers on Bikes! This year, the Bristol Babbers will be doing the 200 mile ride in reverse, from Charlton Farm and heading on down to Little Harbour in St Austell. In the run-up they are doing lots of other fund raising events to hit their donation target of £4800. Firstly, on Friday 17th November 2023, The Bristol Babbers will be set up on static bikes at along and cheer them on and donate all you can in the process. They will have buckets for cash and card machines for contactless donations.

Charlton Farm has a special place in The Bristol Babbers' hearts as Zoe's son, Callum was diagnosed with **Dravet Syndrome** at the age of two. Callum is now aged 16 and has faced so many challenges, but Charlton Farm has been there every step of the way providing the most amazing care, family respite and support; their staff, facilities and care are truly phenomenal.



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Climate Resilience Nature Nietes in Shirehampton

Our climate is warming much more quickly than expected. Last September was the hottest September on record. While we were hoping to limit warming to 1.5 degrees centigrade by 2030 we find we are already 1.4 degrees warmer than in pre-industrial times. We have reached the danger zone. Instead of increasing its efforts to reduce carbon emissions or help us prepare for the extreme weather ahead the government has rowed back on its net zero targets. This summer's fires, floods and heatwaves are a foretaste of what we can expect in the pretty near future. And it's going to be up to us to prepare for what's coming.

The Climate Emergency Group invited climate activist and researcher Nikki Jones to help us think through what we here in Shirehampton can do to become more climate resilient. About 20 people, most local but several from further afield, turned up to hear her and offer their concerns, questions and suggestions.

Nikki asked us to imagine how we would respond to the kind of extreme weather events we are likely to see by 2030: Extreme heat - temperatures up to 47 degrees for several days; extreme cold – like the Beast from the East'; severe storms – with destructive winds. What will prolonged periods of extreme weather mean for our daily life?

There will be disruption to power supplies, to water supplies, to food supply chains, to all transport. We won't be able to rely on help from elsewhere. So what measures can we begin to put in place NOW that would help us deal with what we'll be facing?

There were many suggestions:

Community messaging will be really important in all of these scenarios so perhaps we should set up local neighbourhood communications networks like WhatsApp and think about how we would maintain contact with local radio or neighbours who might be in need.

We will need to identify and publicise local 'places of refuge' from heat or cold, high winds, heavy rain or

flooding. We'll need to equip our own households with emergency stocks of food and water. Perhaps we should set up neighbourhood tool banks so we know who to call on if we find we need a chain saw or a shovel.

We could have talked on for hours. This was an interesting but daunting exercise. It began to bring home what some of the real time, daily life impacts of climate change will be. If you want to know more, look for The Bristol Resilience Strategy - Bristol City Council www.bristol.gov.uk.


This Red Admiral posed beautifully for me a few weeks ago. I had taken some friends down to the Daisy Field near the station to see the superb 'War Horse' memorial.

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WESTlink is a new type of bus service which operates in the vast majority of the West of England, outside of Bristol and Bath city centres. It runs without a fixed timetable or route, and is booked 'on demand' by users through the WESTlink app or by phone.

Passengers can get on or off at existing bus stops (over 1,800) as well as at a number of easy to reach places, and then connect to major bus and rail services.

WESTlink is an on-demand bus service which doesn't have fixed routes or timetables. Passengers can use WESTlink to connect with major bus and rail services as well as local destinations such as shops, hospital appointments, or to meet up with friends. Seats are easily booked by app, phone, or website up to 24 hours in advance or on the day when you want to travel. WESTlink will work out your closest pickup and drop-off locations based on where you and other passengers are going at the same time.

If booking by phone, an operator will take your booking and payment, or you can give cash to the driver. The phone operator will tell you where to meet your bus.

Booking with the app enter your pickup and dropoff addresses, choose the ride that works best for you and tap book ride.

The app will also notify you of the vehicle's arrival time and allow you to track the bus in real time.

The bright green WESTlink mini buses are easy to spot and feature comfortable seats, wheelchair access and spaces for passengers with push chairs or folding bikes.

Passengers can get on or off at existing bus stops or transport hubs to make an onward journey or at virtual bus stops created an easy to reach places like local landmarks.

Book on-demand buses to travel at a time that suits you. WESTlink services go where they're needed and run without a set timetable.

I recently booked a trip for 5 of us from Lansdown Park and Ride, north of Bath, to Hawkesbury Upton at 10am. The bus was waiting when we got there. I'd also booked a pick up at 3:15pm from Tormarton, having completed our latest leg of the Cotswold Way walking route, and again the bus arrived on time. You can use Bus passes or pay £2 each (cash) on the bus.

Shirehampton is in the Future Transport Zone which covers most of North Bristol. However, the South Zone stretches as far as the Portway Park



and Ride and you can book a bus to take you to most places in North Somerset, including Portishead, Clevedon, Weston, and east to Axbridge, Chew Valley, Midsomer Norton, Radstock, and villages south of Bath. Give it a try, you can only book 24 hours or less in advance, but it's well worth it.

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An Update from Darren Jones MP, Bristol North West

At the end of September, Shire residents congregated in Shire Public Hall for my inaugural Village Meeting. With such a strong sense of community in our village, people were undeterred by the rain and filled the hall in a way that I haven't seen for a constituency event since the Brexit debates!

The **Village Meetings** came about as a followup to an interesting **Constituency Assembly** that I held earlier this year, in which 50 people from across **Bristol North West** were selected to take part based on area, age, gender, race and other demographics to reflect the constituency as a whole.

The Constituency Assembly revealed distinct differences in how people from different areas in Bristol North West feel about where they live. That's why I'm taking this village-by-village approach to talk to constituents about the problems they're facing and what would make the biggest difference to their communities. The latest results of my online survey were used as a jumping-off point for the Village Meeting discussion, and it seemed people in the room largely agreed with the findings.

The survey results for Shire revealed that about 4 in 5 residents view the area as a village – no surprise to

me! – and about half are 'happy' or 'very happy' about where they live.

But the survey also revealed problems. When people were asked which words best describe the area they live in, the top five responses for Shire were 'declining', 'rundown', 'characterful', 'historic' and 'dirty'. This led to a lively discussion in the room about the poor state of the high street, with empty shops and littering in the village, with one constituent saying it's getting harder and harder to have pride in Shire when the bins are overflowing. The swell of feeling on this issue of reinstating pride in Shire by cleaning up the village saw the hall break out in a round of applause.

I will be following up on actions from all the Village Meetings in the weeks and months to come, and welcome further input from you on how we can work together to solve these problems.

Moving on to a problem facing people across the constituency: access to **NHS dentistry**.

At the start of October, I gathered dentists from across Bristol North West, NHS managers and Bristol public health leaders for a dental summit to see what more can be done locally to help improve access to NHS dentistry.

The dentists agreed we need more funding for urgent care, with some calling for an expansion of 'stabilisation clinics', in which NHS dentistry is offered over a couple of months for people without a dentist to stabilise their oral health. They said stabilisation clinics can help to prevent the need for repeat urgent care appointments – and we all know that prevention is better than cure. There were interesting discussions on how vanbased mobile clinics in community settings, such as outside a GP practice, could be useful for more stabilisation clinic work.

If, like me, you weren't familiar with stabilisation clinics, it's worth noting you can ask for this by phoning **NHS 111** – the same number that you call for urgent care appointments.

There's a lot more work that needs to be done on dentistry, but I feel the summit unearthed some interesting ideas that warrant further investigation. More to come!

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Have Your Say on Portway Proposals

People who live or travel along the A4 Portway in Bristol are being encouraged to give their views on a series of designs that have been drawn up to allow buses to move more quickly through traffic along the route and make cycling and walking safer and more enjoyable.

The council ran an early engagement exercise last summer to find out what issues people face when travelling along the **north western section of the A4 Portway**. This feedback has been used to create proposals for how the route could be improved, including introducing a 24-hour bus lane on both sides of the road along most of the route, widening narrow pavements that are shared by pedestrians and cyclists, and reducing the speed limit in places from 50mph to 40mph.

The scope of the A4 Portway project starts at the M5 flyover, it travels along the A4 passing the Avon Gorge and onto Hotwell Road to the Jacob's Wells Road roundabout, then along Anchor Road, and up to Explore Lane.

Councillor Don Alexander, Cabinet Member for Transport, said: "Throughout the first round of early engagement, we found that bus users wanted to feel more connected to the north of the city with

more frequent services to more areas. Many were in favour of longer operating times for the **Portway Park & Ride** service and thought bus lanes would make buses more reliable overall. People who walk or cycle along the route raised issues of narrow shared spaces on pavements, the quality of the surface, and the speed of traffic.

"In response, we've put together a series of proposals that answer many of these concerns. This consultation is a further chance to be involved in the process and have your say."

Views can be given through an online survey which is running until Sunday 12 November 2023.


















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Break Charity Shop

Break Charity Shop has become very much part of the fixtures and fittings on our High Street. You never know what treasures you may find in this shop and at a low cost too especially with the cost of living crisis taking hold.

Holly Hayward has been the Manager for the Shirehampton branch of Break Shop since February 2023 and has been a familiar face in our local village for over four years working in retail.

"I chose to work in retail as I am very much a people person. I've always been friendly and outgoing and like getting to know people. It's really good for me to be working locally. I am a single mum of one, I have my own health conditions and it's close to where I live. The High Street provides jobs for many people living in Shirehampton and the surrounding area and it's important for our local economy"

"Every day is different. We rely on donations and stock rotation, but a typical day is getting the clothes out onto the rails, filling our shelves with ceramics, books, CDs, toys and more and regularly updating our shop window displays. I love interacting with our customers and letting them know they are welcome and can come in for a chat."

"Like everyone on the High Street we are all facing challenges at the moment and it is important for



everyone to keep shopping locally and help keep many of our shops in business. Buying from a local shop contributes a proportion staff wages, keeps a roof over our head, puts food on the table for our families. Without a High Street or local businesses our whole community would be seriously affected, especially the elderly, disabled and those unable to go further afield for shopping. Our local economy will fail and it doesn't help with high rents being charged by landlords."

Volunteers are needed to help run the shop and dropping off donations to the shop has had it




problems in recent weeks, being left outside the shop to the elements only for them to be ruined and binned.

"The best time to drop in donations is quarter past nine until three in the afternoon, Monday to Saturday, we take everything except baby equipment. That was my choice due to health and safety. For instance a car seat, I don't know if its been in an accident. I don't want to put a baby in a pram and it collapses. I don't want that on my head."

"And yes we do need volunteers for our shop. People can come in and see me and have a chat about the hours they would like to do. You can stack the shelves, you can hang clothing, I will show you how to use the till. And you'll be meeting our customers. You will become part of a team". Said Holly.



Before that the staff and cadets had to make use of the smaller office building for training purposes and **Terri** has been full of praise on how they adapted to the change

We've also had a few recreation nights where we all go down to **Portishead**, they all have a good swim and we make sure they are safe in the water. We are planning on doing a weekend of training at the unit where our

cadets come on board Friday evening, sleep over and then Saturday morning go down to **Bristol centre** and do a full day boating out on the water doing paddle and power boating. They'll come back in the evening for food and watch a movie then the next day they might be boating again or be doing other qualifications that they need to progress further in the unit." said Terri.

I knew the **Avonmouth Unit** was in need of additional Trustees, in particular someone who could take on fundraising responsibilities and wanted to build on adding more Sea Cadets to the unit.

"Fundraising has been a huge challenge and we are in need of a **Fundraising Trustee** as well others to fill the gaps within the **Board of Trustees**. They also get involved with local community activities.

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
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City and Port of Bristol Bowling Club
