Liberty for Shire's Warhorse

Following a number of years tethered to a fence in Tynings Field, whilst the project faced delays, our beautifully crafted Warhorse has finally found freedom in its new home in the Daisy Field. The site of the sculpture, originally the vision of *Diane Gait* and created by *Jason Baggs*, overlooks the Avon, Pill Harbour and the lower level of the Daisy Field. It was sited there so as to be visible from as wide an area as possible, including the Portway, the railway and Pill Harbour.

John Hastings began the unveiling ceremony by introducing a number of eminent people with local connections who came to join a large crowd of Shire residents and folk from much further afield to witness the culmination of the Warhorse project.

Our local **Sea Cadets**, dressed immaculately in uniform and led by their **Commanding Officer Alison Fowler** formed a moving guard of honour at each corner of the sculpture. Other cadets helped with stewarding duties and with handing




As summer turns to autumn our parade night boating draws to a close, but there are plans for boating during the October half term.



THE GREEN PAGES THE GREEN PAGES THE WORLD IS GETTING WARNER

Early September and we are having a heat wave, set to break records for highest September temperatures ever. But not something to celebrate, especially when people are dying in little reported but catastrophic floods in central Spain, in Greece, in Hong Kong.

President Biden may think "Nobody can deny the impact of the Climate Crisis," but unfortunately, our government seems able to. No one there seems concerned about what this record-breaking heat wave is telling us and we might ask how concerned we are ourselves. The September 9th March for Fairer Buses was very sparsely attended even though we know that affordable, reliable public transport is essential if we are to reduce our reliance on fossil fuels meet our net zero emissions targets. It is also essential that we stop airport expansion. Bristol Airport is to expand by two million passengers a year, despite advice from the government's own Climate Advisory Committee, and massive local opposition from the North Somerset planning decision, local MPs, surrounding councils, and the nearly 9,000 people who objected in writing to the proposals, to say nothing of the thousands who marched against it!

And so.... "About 40 people braved one of the hottest September days on record on Saturday September 9th for a pilgrimage from **Bristol Cathedral** to Bristol Airport. **Reverend Jonnie Parkin, Canon Missioner and XR member**, blessed the walkers before they set off. The focus of the pilgrimage was prayer and witness. There were several stops along the way to give thanks for sun, water, weather, and all the goodness of the earth. **All Saints Church Long Ashton** and **St Katherine's Church Felton** provided shelter from the heat and refreshments along the way. Many of the pilgrims were keen to mark the end of the pilgrimage by praying peacefully inside the airport itself but were prevented from entering by airport staff. They chose to claim the roundabout just outside as sacred ground instead."

Here in Shirehampton **Ruth Whiter**, from the **Climate Emergency Group** offered a **Sustainable Fashion** morning on **23rd September**. We know that the UK sends millions of tons of discarded clothing to landfills in **Ghana** and **South America** destroying their local fashion industries and creating serious pollution. So, we thought we would have a morning about re-using, repairing, up-cycling the clothes we have and making them last longer. We had some expert seamstresses and textile artists there to help. We were there to encourage one another to do whatever WE can locally to reduce our contribution to one of the biggest polluters and contributors to global warming: fashion. We really are concerned.






Apologies for not leaving a report last month folks, but I managed to delete the draft not once but twice!

Bristol North West is made up of a number of historic villages, each with its own identity and charm. Retaining such a strong sense of village life in the suburbs of a major city isn't something that is commonplace elsewhere in the UK. It makes me proud to be Bristolian.

That's why I've launched a new campaign to cultivate and celebrate the charm of village life across **Bristol North West**. And where else could I start the Village Meetings than right here in **Shire** – *the village that my family and I call home*.

Returning to the history of our village, I was proud to take part in the unveiling of the **Shirehampton Warhorse statue** at **The Daisy Field** in mid-September. The 2-metre horse statue, made entirely of horseshoes, honours the 300,000 horses that passed through Avonmouth and Shire during World War I, when Britain's war effort relied on horses to transport soldiers and supplies. Shire was home to one of the country's largest **Remount Depots**, where horses and mules that had been purchased overseas and shipped to Avonmouth were trained for war service. It's a remarkable part of Shire's heritage, and the statue will help this knowledge to be passed down to future generations.

Ending on some personal news, I'm thrilled to have joined Labour's frontbench to serve as Shadow Chief Secretary to the Treasury. In this role,

researching the history of The Remount Depot in conjunction with the staff and children of Avonmouth Primary School. It was a fascinating project for the adults and children and it has given us a much better understanding of that period of Shirehampton history. It certainly provided an answer for puzzled local residents who for many years had been unearthing horseshoes in their vegetable patches and flower beds. Darren Jones then spoke of his pride as a local lad in sharing this significant event with his local community in his capacity as their representative at Westminster. He spoke of the importance of strong community engagement and a sense of belonging which he shares with the people of the Northwest Bristol Constituency which he represents. As the onlookers waited patiently for the Warhorse to be unveiled, the last to speak was Peaches Golding, the Lord Lieutenant of Bristol representing King Charles III. She began by passing on the best wishes of the Sovereign before giving a moving account of the realities faced by horses and men during the war and then pointed out the view over the Avon to Pill where many horses crossed by ferry to see out their days in the fields of Somerset.

Next came the much-anticipated unveiling which proved to be a little more difficult than anticipated. The weight of the cover, a little damp from the preceding rain, made it tricky to lift and it became stubbornly snagged on our horse's ears! With a flash of inspiration, Peaches Golding raised her ceremonial sword and managed to help free the cover and finally, to much applause, the Shirehampton Warhorse was freed from its shroud. Alison Sowton, the Vicar of St. Mary's began her moving blessing by referring to the horse's shyness in revealing itself! Alison referred to the horrors suffered by horses and people during the First World War and called for peace and harmony and an end to conflict and division. I know that we have heard these calls many times before but, for me at least, Alison's quiet and moving blessing made in this setting and amongst local



residents and friends had a special resonance which will live long in the memory. Finally, there was community singing of "Only Remembered", adapted by John Tams for the Warhorse stage production. Tina Biggs, of Shirehampton Sailing Club, accompanied on the violin as Paul McMillan led the singing.

During and at the conclusion of the Daisy Field proceedings entry forms were distributed for the children's art and writing competition. A reminder that entries should be left in the **Shire Newspaper tray** in **Shirehampton Library** no later than **Saturday September 30th**. Many people then retired to the hospitality provided by our Sea Cadets at their HQ on the banks of the Avon. Once again, the cadets were attentive, efficient and polite as they greeted their guests and helped to clear tables. Many thanks to **Richard Smith and family** for staffing the galley with charm and good humour.

This was a momentous day in Shirehampton history, celebrating and remembering not only our past but also who and what we are now as a community. As a very new member of that community, I can only say how proud and honoured I felt to have been part of it. Here's wishing our beautiful Warhorse a long and happy future in its new home.


everyone noticed the difference, especially his father who was very pleased.

Climate Fashion Repair Café

Shirehampton Climate Emergency Group held their Climate Fashion Repair Café at the Public Hall on Saturday 23rd September. It attracted many people to visit and call in to see what was happening. Every stall had an environmentally friendly theme which included ways to repair clothing and knitwear, tie dye your own clothing and a swap shop table of clothing. Some of the things you could easily do from home and even clothes swap between friends and family.

Tandem Arts were recycling items for their crafts, Bristol Energy Network and the Cold Homes Energy Efficiency Survey Experts (C.H.E.E.S.E.) Project, Bristol were on hand for information and advice on how to keep our homes warmer and draft free with winter just around the corner. Poppies On The Green were also doing a two hour painting poppies session and there was homemade cake and refreshments on offer too.

Renée is a member of the **Shirehampton Climate Emergency Group** and I asked her what the event was all about?

"Today has been about climate and climate resilience and we know from Oxfam statistics the UK buys more clothes than any place else in Europe. It then sends more clothing to recycling, which is not recycled but shipped abroad and because it is acrylic and plastic fibres it becomes an everlasting source of pollution in places like Ghana. We also learn from 'Oxfam Second Hand September' that two tons of clothing that we have bought, the whole process will give off more carbon emissions than over 700 round the world flights. The fashion/ clothing industry, is one of the 3 biggest polluters and makes more carbon than aviation and shipping combined. Though I haven't said any of this to anybody there are little notices around and the point is to get people to stop buying, to keep the clothes they love and keep on wearing them this will help reduce carbon emissions" said Renée.

I spoke with **Georgie** who was doing the tie dye table: " I brought in a few of my old t-shirts for



people to try out tie dying for themselves. It's really easy to do. I've been using a pack that I bought and it came with all the dye colours needed and squeezy bottles to help with precision dying. Once you put the dye on the fabric you then have to wait for about six hours before rinsing it off and then putting into a cold wash on its own because you don't want the colours to run onto other clothing and that's pretty much it. The idea is to find different ways to keeping your clothes for longer and think of different ways to upcycle them such as tie dye, using patches, putting sparkly things on them, whatever you choose and potentially lengthen the life of your clothes".

Tracey was on hand from C.H.E.E.S.E and explained what they do: "We do thermal surveys in your home so every room is surveyed individually and we're just looking for where those drafts are. Drafts are uncontrollable and allow cold air where it shouldn't. It completely different to ventilation and the drafts need to be stopped in their tracks. Our surveyors, although it's not professional advice, are able to recommend solutions and things that people should be looking at. It could be something simple like putting silicone round a window, draft proofing a door and things that can be easily fixed by you. We also give you the fully recorded visual and audio room by room. If you did need a contractor, you've got a bit more information to go to them with. It gives you a bit more power to say 'this is what I need'"

I asked Renée would they be doing this event again? "That depends on volunteers. I think it has to be a community endeavour. We've put this on to show people what it could be but everybody has to get behind it."



SPORT IN SHIREHAMPTON S. 25/26 **City and Port of Bristol Bowling Club**

After fifty years of bowling on the green in Nibley Road, Shirehampton and three years prior to that sharing Avonmouth Bowling Clubs original green, the City and Port of Bristol Bowling Club will close at the end of the season.



Paul Bywater has been a member of the club from when it was founded in June 1970 until closure at the end of this season.

The worsening state of the green over the past season and a half has caused immense dissatisfaction amongst members and visiting bowlers alike. One visiting bowler earlier this season was heard to say --- this is not a bowling green.

Toward the end of this season the green reached a state whereby it was no longer playable and the remaining home friendly fixtures were switched to playing away.

The problems started in 2022 when financial support from the main club ceased, although support in other ways continued and they made clear that they wanted to see bowling continue at the club. The current green keeper could no longer be afforded without support from the main club so an affordable alternative was found by the

Unfortunately, from that point the green deteriorated, members have become dissatisfied and many of them decided well before the end of the season to find another club for 2024.

An EGM was held on August 21st so that members could be made aware of the situation and be given the opportunity to cast a vote in favour of continuation or closure. The result of the ballot was overwhelmingly in favour of closure.

This was a decision made by the bowling club without pressure to close from the main club, who would like bowling to continue at what would be a greatly improved green. Any suggestion that the bowling club has effectively been thrown out --is incorrect.

Present at the EGM was Paul Bywater who was also at the meeting in June 1970 when it was decided to form a bowling club based at the port. The club was formed and developed very quickly --- sharing a green in Avonmouth and buying woods for members to bowl with using money granted by the main club. In the first year they had thirty members and were playing friendly games, joining the league and arranging social events.

In 1973 the main club said yes to installing a green adjacent to the main club building. It cost $f_{,7500}$ and was ready to play on in 1974. A further £2000 was spent on the green surround and fence.

The famous David Bryant once played on the green --- for Redland Green in a Cup Match --- his team didn't want to play because the green wasn't good at the

time --- but David stepped in and declared --- it's the same for both sides. They played --- and Redland won.

Closure of the club does not affect the Winter Bowling Break in Torquay in March 2024 - we are all looking forward to it.
