Queen Camilla Opens New Library at Shirehampton Primary School

Shirehampton Primary School had the honour of hosting Her Majesty Queen Camilla, on her first official visit since the coronation of King Charles III.

National Literary Trust Patron, Queen Camilla arrived by helicopter, landing in the playing fields of The Port of Bristol Sports and Community Hub, before officially opening Shirehampton Primary School's new library - the first of 50 school Coronation Libraries to be opened this year.

The Coronation Libraries will be established in communities where the cost-of-living crisis is biting hardest and children in the Coronation year are least likely to have books at home. Each library or reading space will be refurbished, restocked and a member of staff will be trained to provide a range of reading activities for the whole school. As well as being a Coronation Library, Shirehampton's new reading space is also the **500th library** to be transformed as part of the **Primary School Library Alliance campaign**. Founded by the **National Literacy Trust and Penguin Random House UK**, the Alliance works to address the chronic lack of investment in primary school libraries and bring together relevant parties to help solve this urgent issue.

PUBLIC INFORMATION FOR JULY IRON BRIDGE RESTORATION PLANS APPROVED

At June's cabinet the Council discussed a report that sets out their plans to restore the Kingsweston Iron Bridge. This Grade II listed cast iron footbridge was built around 1800 and spans Kingsweston Lane, linking Blaise Castle Estate to Kingsweston Fields. Mayor Marvin Rees writes:

We had to **close the Bridge in 2015** after a series of strikes by trucks made the bridge unstable and unsafe. Since then, it has been secured and propped up by scaffolding, while we sought a long-term solution that is sensitive to its historic nature. The good news is that our planning application – to raise **Kingsweston Lane Bridge** by just over a metre, add steps at either end and fully restore it – has been approved. That means, with cabinet approval, we can work up our $\pounds 1$ million plans to dismantle the bridge and repair it off-site and reinstate it, at a raised height, using money from our **Highway Infrastructure Bridge Investments fund**.

COUNCIL TRAFFIC IMPROVEMENT SCHEMES Improving Bristol Bridge for Pedestrians and Cyclists

Construction work to make travelling across **Bristol Bridge** easier will get underway from **12 June**. Since the bus gate, which restricts general traffic and prioritises buses, was introduced in 2020 the road layout and traffic signals on Bristol Bridge are no longer appropriate with the reduced traffic flow. Because the old traffic signals on Bristol Bridge are coming towards the end of their serviceable life, plans to remove them and make a series of improvements have been brought forward.

Cotham Hill Transport and Pedestrianisation Works to Start in June

Construction work is taking place this summer and autumn on and around **Cotham Hill**, as part of plans to permanently improve the area for pedestrians, cyclists, and businesses.

The permanent changes will make it easier and safer to walk and cycle in the area; encourage active travel; manage traffic flow; reduce pollution in the area and support local businesses who will benefit from space for outdoor trading.


Construction work is due to start in June 2023 and be completed by the end of the year.

As I sit down to write this hundreds of fires are burning in Canada. The eastern United

As I sit down to write this hundreds of fires are burning in Canada. The eastern United States from New York to Washington is shrouded in dense suffocating smoke. Here we are warned to expect a heat wave; there are wild fires burning in Aberystwyth too. Floods cover Ukraine's rich agricultural land. But schools are closing in the Southeast because there is no water. Fire and flood and drought are man-made disasters and will have devastating consequences for all of us in the very near future.

It's hard to remain hopeful when you see what is happening. So what is the Climate Emergency Group doing to address the situation? The question itself makes me laugh because we are just a small group of ordinary people. We don't have any superpowers. But we do what we can. Our June meeting discussed installing air-sourced heat pumps so we can heat our homes without burning fossil fuels. We came away with some clear ideas about how to go about changing to more efficient, less expensive, low-carbon heating. It's a big step for anyone toward reducing their own carbon footprint. You can find out more from the Bristol Centre for Sustainable Energy or the Energy Saving Trust. Or consult an independent retrofit advisor like Home-Futureproof or HeatGeek. Energy Saving Trust.

Our local meeting offered practical advice on carbon reducing measures we can take ourselves. But we desperately need the government to step up and honour its commitments to reduce carbon emissions.

The major Climate Event event of June was the launch of **The Oil Fountain at Bristol Cathedral**.

The Oil Fountain is a new work by Bristol based installation artist **Luke Jerram**. It illustrates our dependence on oil and the urgent need for us to **Just Stop** using it.

Dozens of climate activists from Christian Climate Action, Just Stop Oil, Extinction Rebellion, the Red Rebels, the Bristol Climate Choir and other groups joined Canon Missioner Jonnie Parkin to formally open *The Oil Fountain* to the public. The Red Rebels and the Climate Choir led us in to the cathedral. The Canon Missioner welcomed us all and reminded us in the words of **St Francis** that the natural world provides us with all that is needed to sustain life. Yet our over dependence on fossil fuels is destroying that natural world.

Bristol Cathedral and Extinction Rebellion may seem unlikely allies. But climate activists of all kinds have joined forces to show the government just how urgent it is that we **JUST STOP OIL**.





Our Changing Library Service

There is no doubt that our libraries are changing and change they must in response, not only to ever tightening budgets, but also to the changing needs of the communities they serve. The good news is that the library service has been recruiting recently, taking on 25 part time library assistants as well as full-time posts at the Central Library. If you haven't visited the Central Library on College Green yet, put visiting this beautiful building on your list of things to do this Summer.

Our local libraries also have much to offer, and involvement of the local community is at the heart of the city's Library Strategy. This led to the creation of "Friends Groups" whose purpose is "to help create a library service that works for the whole community."

Examples of the work that these groups do are hosting coffee mornings as a social activity and to fundraise, raising money for extra library equipment or activities such as writing workshops, promoting their local library on social media, arranging talks with authors, and generally supporting the Bristol Library Strategy. You may be aware that we have our very own Friends of Shirehampton Library Group (FoSL). John Hastings, one of the FoSL members, has provided the following summary of what is currently on offer

at your local library:

Every Tuesday afternoon 3pm-5pm, "Shire's Living Room" Free Tea/Coffee and Biscuits, games, quizzes, and always a friendly chat.

Every Wednesday 6pm-7pm, IT Literacy Group. If you have a Smartphone, Tablet, or Laptop and aren't sure how to use it, we have experts willing and ready to help you.

1st Wednesday of each month 7:30pm-9pm, **Record Appreciation Club.** We pick a classic vinyl album, play it on audio equipment provided by the Library Services, and have a chat about it.

2nd Thursday of each month 6pm-8pm, Family History Group. We have a team of experts who can help you through the minefield of Genealogy, using Ancestry.com provided on the Library Computers and other online tools.



John also pointed out that you can listen to audio books, download e-books, and order books/maps etc. from a wide network of county library services across the West Country, and have them delivered to Shire Library. You can also use the services to read newspapers and magazines on your phone and laptop/tablet. All these services can be used by having a library card and an online pin number, which you can set up by visiting Shire Library.



New Road Safety Group for Shirehampton

Anna and Theresa are two residents who have teamed up to form 'Shirehampton Road Safety Group'. They held a drop-in session at the Public Hall on Tuesday 13th June to find out what issues are facing Shirehampton's community.

Both have young families and live in Shirehampton. "I absolutely love Shirehampton and everything about it. Since having my little boy, I have become increasingly concerned personally about the speeding in the village and dangerous driving. So as a result, I did some research into what could be done. Since then, I have spoken to our local Councillor Don Alexander and the police, and I've been told we need to build up a picture of what the community want in the village and once we've done that we can then start to find out what can be done." said Anna.

"I have some concerns about, traffic, congestion, and speeding in the village. The main concern is that many roads are being used as a rat run through the village rather than using the Portway and I'd like to tackle some of these issues. We'd like to work with the local community, get everyone's opinions and concerns and look at some of the root causes for some of these things." said **Theresa**.

"We've met some nice local people today, a real mix of age ranges from young mums to the older generation to people who have lived here for many years and have been wanting a change for a long time."

"The main concerns from today's drop-in session and the emails we have had to date is speeding, parking, what parking spaces are available and where people are parking, including where people are parking illegally and of course lack of parking available. Speeding in various parts of the village is causing real concern. At the moment the one thing people are really concerned about is the electric scooters and electric bikes." said Anna

"We also want to work with the local primary and secondary schools in Shirehampton, one of the main issues that keep coming up is inconsiderate parking by parents at drop off time and at peak times and how it causes our roads to be unsafe. We'd like to see how we can work together, collaborate with schools and parents because I am sure the next generation is looking at transport in an active, healthy and safe way in our community." Theresa added.

Other issues included parking on double yellows, on kerbs, grass verges and pavements as well as speeding especially through the High Street. "We are looking for volunteers for the community speed watch we are setting up because it's part of gathering a picture of what is going on in the village and to prove there is a speeding issue". said Anna.

"The volunteer commitment is not huge. It's about an hour each month but we are looking to represent the various areas in Shirehampton. Please contact us if you wish to become a volunteer, have any burning issues, or concerns you want to raise, challenges faced and things that have been tried before. This is not a blame game. It's about looking at the causes and finding

mean the Will cannot be located or an older Will could be thought to be the most recent.

If a Will cannot be located upon the testator's death, there is a presumption that the Will was intentionally destroyed and therefore revoked. However, what if the Will has simply been misplaced? The testator who made the Will is no longer alive, and so it is very difficult to rebut this presumption, which could lead to their estate passing under intestacy rules and possibly passing to those the testator did not want to inherit.

An Update from Darren Jones MP, Bristol North West BETTER

What games did you play when you were a child? This was the topic of conversation at Bristol Dementia Action Alliance's first Memory Cafe in Shire, which I was happy to attend in May to lend my support.

shared fond memories of playing old favourites, such as marbles, Cat's Cradle, and hopscotch. Attendees recalled the freedom they had as children to explore their neighbourhoods on their bikes in the days before mobile phones, when the only signal to head back home was the streetlights turning on.

We took this trip down memory lane because people with dementia often find it easier to recall memories from the distant past than recent events. There was also plenty of time for informal chat, tea and biscuits, and playing games in small groups. The Memory Café is a wonderful way for people with dementia and their carers to build new connections with people going through similar struggles.

If you would like to pop along to a future event, it will run on the third Friday of every month from 2pm-4pm at the JTE Hub in Shirehampton Methodist Church.

I was also pleased to learn more about the organisation's project to make Shire Bristol's first 'Dementia Aware Village'. They'll be talking to

Despite the differences in ages in the room, we all local businesses about simple changes to make their spaces more welcoming to people with dementia.

> We have a wonderful sense of community in Shire, so I hope businesses take onboard the advice. I'm happy to support the project in any way that I can.

> That sense of community spirit and willingness to act was evident in my recent bus campaign. In April and May, the campaign received more bus journeys logged from Shire than anywhere else in the constituency. Thank you to everyone who supported the campaign!

> In January, Doug Claringbold, the Managing Director of First Bus in the West of England, assured me that bus reliability would improve from April. Sadly, that isn't what your data is showing me: in March, about one in four journeys logged across the constituency were ghost buses - services that were scheduled, but never materialise - and this increased to about one in three for April/May.

> The number 3 has even worse stats, with ghost buses accounting for 42% of journeys logged in April/ May. A further 21% for this route were logged as cancelled. This isn't good enough.



While the findings paint a pessimistic picture of the state of our bus services, I now have solid data to hold First Bus to account. (The vast majority of journeys logged were for First Bus services.)

My team is compiling the key findings into a document that should be published on the campaign page (www.darren-jones.co.uk/bus) by the time you read this. I'll also be writing to Doug Claringbold to find out what's gone wrong after he'd been so adamant that reliability would improve.

Data collection has ended, but the campaign continues!







We will be attending several local events over the coming months, so please come and say hello.


